The Marshfield W. C. T. U. entertained the County Institute at the Baptist church January 22, Mrs. C. C. Hulet, county president, in charge. The morning session was devoted to business and departmental work.

The County Institute will sponsor scientific temperance instruction and essay contest in our public schools.

Rev. Chas. Johnson gave the helpful devotional service and noon-tide prayer, after which all enjoyed a delightful luncheon.

Coos county received the state banner for efficiency the past year. Our slogan for this year will be "Constructive Prospection." A group institute will be held in February, probably in Roseburg, for the counties of Coos Douglas and Lane.

During the afternoon session, Mrs. Chas. Needham sang two beautiful solos. Then Rev. C. C. Hulet gave a splendid address on "Victory Day," with the plea, "May we push the truths of our cause with earnestness and vigor, and give prohibition a chance."

A resolution was adopted as follows: "We, the W. C. T. U. in our Coos County Institute, at Marshfield, Jan. 22, 1929, do protest against cigarette advertising in our daily papers, we also protest against cigarette advertising over the radio." There-

fore be it resolved that we send a copy of this resolution to the county papers and also to our broadcasting stations.

Oil Stock Pays Dividend

Bandon Has New Fire Engine

The new American LaFrance fire engine, being taken to Bandon for delivery, stopped in Coquille just before noon Wednesday for a demonstration. Three of the fire boys held the nozzle and the engine was gradually speeded up. At 180 pounds pressure a coupling separated and there was a wild scrambling for a safe and dry spot.

At that pressure, with the small nozzles in use here the stream was thrown 150 feet. The engine is capable of producing a 250 pound pressure.

"Back Trailers from the Middle Border" by Hamlin Garland. An autobiographical story of trailing back from the frontier to "pioneer" in the East.

"Bambi," Felix Salten—among the best sellers. A delightfully illustrated tale of a young deer, an idyl of animal life.

"Captain Fred," by himself. "The only man who ever walked home from a whaling voyage." He shipped aboard a whaler at 14, spent a life time in the South Seas and the Arctic, walked alone over Alaska to summon help. There is too much of it to recount but Captain Fred is nearly 70 now and his life was chock full of adventure. "South Gate," by Grace S. Richmond. Modern life in fast society. Rich home, poor home. A stirring story.

"Wild Horse Mesa," by Zane Grey. One of those fine western romances.

"The Hounds of God," by Rafael Sabatine. Sabatine's stories need no introducing. This new and justly popular story is of England and Spain at the time of the Armada. Romantic adventure. Despair. Love and the Spanish Inquisition!

"Cowboy," by Ross Santee. The story of a real boy, who said good-bye to his family and rode away across the southwest to become a cowboy in Arizona.

"The Land of the Laughing Buddha," by Upton Close. A book full of romance, adventure, humorous intrigue, political upheavals and what not, in China. Written by a born traveller and expert journalist, who knows his Chinese.

"Joshua's Vision," by Locke. The writer does not know what this story is about but the combinations of names Joshua and Locke sounds promising.

He Accepted for \$3.00 per Day

In a letter to the Coquille Chamber of Commerce, read to the directors Wednesday evening, Hon. J. E. Norton, representative from Coos county, states that he knew what salary was paid legislators before he consented to enter the race for that office, and that he is unwilling to accept for himself more than the constitution provides as pay for representatives and senators. He therefore notifies the Chamber of what he intends doing with the additional emoluments in the following words:

"I find that sufficient signers have been secured to insure the passage of this measure. I did not sign it and do not favor it, but knowing that it will be passed I do not care to appear on the floor of the house in the roll of conscientious objector.

"When this money is received, it is my intention to turn it over to the county chamber of commerce to be used for one of two purposes as the board of directors of the county chamber may decide, either to be applied to the advertising fund for the purpose of publishing the agricultural, industrial and recreational resources of Coos county or if in their opinion it should be expended for state-wide purposes, then it shall be turned over to the Oregon state chamber of commerce for use in land settlement work."

If more legislators took the position Mr. Norton does there would be no funds available in this way for chamber of commerce work. But it relieves in no way the stigma which attaches to the state of Oregon for its niggardliness in refusing adequate compensation to the men who serve it as lawmakers.

Hinkson Captured at Last

Robert Hinkson, the 17-year old Eugene youth, who stole three or four automobiles in Oregon a couple of weeks ago, and was reported to have secured a Rolls-Royce in Oakland for two bits, was captured in Modesto last Thursday after he had been as far south as Los Angeles. He has been brought back to Oregon.
