Considering Fishing Laws

Writing of the visit of Hon. J. E. Norton in Bandon a couple of weeks ago, when the subject of fishing, both commercial and sportsmen, was discussed, the Western World tells thus the agreements reached with the local interests there:

At a meeting, with commercial fishermen it was agreed that there should be a dead line at the highway on all the streams between the Coquille and Rogue rivers; that the Coquille river closed season should be from July 15 to August 15 and from December 31 to May 15; that all steelheads caught during these open seasons should be commercial fish; that all streams should be closed to commercial fishing on Saturday nights at 6:30 and kept closed until Sunday night at 6:30 all through the year; that all streams should have a uniform season; that set nets should be at least 300 feet apart; that there should be a higher license for set nets.

Fined for Careless Driving

Mrs. Ivy Tighe, formerly of River-ton, but who now lives above Myrtle Point, pleaded guilty in Justice Stanley's court Tuesday morning to the charge of careless driving, and was sentenced to 60 days in jail and fined \$100.

The accident for which she was responsible occurred a little after ten last Friday night. Helen Mast, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Webb Mast, of Lee, had been in Coquille for the opera, and was driving home in her Ford roadster. Just beyond the Chaney logging road crossing near Johnson's Mill, she noticed the car approaching on the wrong side of the road, but not until it came closer did she realize that the driver did not intend to turn over to the right side. She then turned to her left but the approaching car caught the Ford broadside, breaking a wheel and mashing fenders and headlight, doing \$30 or \$40 damages.

Miss Mast was picked up by a passing car which brought her to Coquille where she reported the accident to the sheriff's office.

Deputy Sheriff Osmond went out and arrested Mrs. Tighe who had a bottle and had just awakened. She was not entirely sober Saturday morning.

Road Oiling for This Year

Activities on the part of engineers in charge of the state highway department work in this section indicate an early start toward carrying out the oiling project between Coquille and the California line.

Division Engineer W. E. Chandler and Engineer Balcock, in charge of maintenance, visited Bandon Wednesday to confer with the Moore Mill & Lumber company on transportation for road oil. Their plan is to have the steamer Alvarado bring the oil from San Francisco and pump it into tanks located in Bandon, Port Orford and Brookings.

Through a new process of emulsifying the heavy road oil with water it can now be shipped in the fuel storage tanks of a steamer. It is understood that by this new process the heavy road oiling work can be successfully done without the necessity of heating the oil in applying it. The water in the oil increases the penetration, carrying the oil down with it.—Western World.

County Farm Inmate Dies

William Henry Folk, a native of Holland, 88 years of age, died at the county farm last Monday night. He was admitted to the farm last September, and at Christmas wanted to visit at his old home in Marshfield where he had lived for 48 years. He caught a severe cold while there and suffered a stroke of paralysis after his return. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery here.

Mr. Folk was a landscape gardener at the Bay for many years.

through the story of a most active life, great part spent in Oregon, and the judge gave evidence of having done his part in the development of Oregon.

Judge McBride said his parents desired him to become either a physician or a minister, but from inner introspection he found he lacked both the zeal and piety for those professions, so he turned to law. His application for entry to the bar was made before the Supreme court in 1870, and his first case was by appointment to defend a man accused of murder, in Olympia, Wash. When his client was convicted of murder in the first degree he began to wonder if zeal and piety was all he lacked.

The judge first hung out his shingle in Lafayette, Yamhill county, and later moved to St. Helens. At one time he was district attorney for the 5th district, extending along the Columbia river from Clatsop to Wasco, and his reminiscences of horse thief cases in the Wasco end of his district made an interesting story. In 1892 he was elected circuit judge and held the office for 17 years, at which time he was elevated to the supreme bench.

"Justice is and should be the aim of all law, no matter what precedent records," "Ours is the noblest of all professions, let us keep it clean and kick out the shysters," were two of the meaty sentences with which he stressed the every day needs of the law.

Judge D. F. Thompson, called upon by the toastmaster, considered the invitation to attend as a privilege and a pleasure, but inasmuch as the empty flask with which he was presented did not tend to loquacity he declined to make an address.

After a few remarks as "finale" by John G. Mullen, of North Bend, the assembled attorneys and guests stood and drank a toast of pure, clear water, offered by A. J. Sherwood "in token of the respect in which Coos county courts are held by lawyers, and in honor of the two judges who graced the banquet by their presence."
