Lloyd Krantz Dies in California

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. S. D. Walters, at the Chapel here yesterday, for Lloyd Krantz, son of D. C. Krantz, of this city, who was killed in a logging camp near Santa Cruz, last Thursday afternoon. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

His wife accompanied the remains from Santa Cruz, arriving here Tuesday evening.

Lloyd Krantz was born at Dora, March 10, 1902, and was 26 years, ten months and 21 days of age at the time he was killed.

Leaving the ranch ten years ago he has been a woodsman since and worked in the camps of Coos county until his departure for Santa Cruz three months ago.

Soon after his arrival in Santa Cruz he was united in marriage to Miss Kathryn C. Kerr, of North Dakota, who had been visiting in Bandon.

Besides the widow, he is survived by his father; his mother, Mrs. C. W. Weaver, of Myrtle Creek; three brothers and two sisters—Walter R., of Coquille; Chester, of Leneve; Floyd, a twin brother, of Broadbent; Mrs. Luda Robbins, of Broadbent; and Mrs. Sadie Fritts, of Springfield, Ore.

The following account of the accident in the camp of the Monterey Lumber Co., and which resulted in Mr. Krantz' death last Thursday night, is taken from the Santa Cruz Sentinel's report of the coroner's investigation:

J. A. Dahlgren, a woodsman, testified he was in the woods at the time of the accident, which was about 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Krantz was to swing the donkey to make a lead and asked Dahlgren, if he could, have the caterpillar to swing it with, and Dahlgren said, "Go ahead." It was about 20 feet from the donkey and about 60 feet from Krantz. The donkey weighs about 60 tons. Dahlgren had a block half set from the runner and pulled with the caterpillar. The cable was practically new and in fairly good shape. As the caterpillar was pulling, the cable broke a short distance from the caterpillar. The men were standing 20 feet back. As the line snapped it struck Krantz on the stomach. Dahlgren jumped and was not hit as hard, but it struck him on the hip. The cable was a three-quarter inch and when one gets old it is thrown away.

Krantz was a hook tender. He had set the rigging and had not probably set enough blocks.

Dr. W. E. Fehliman testified that Krantz was brought to the Seabright sanitarium Thursday evening about 6

o'clock. He was in a profound shock but was rational. He had a bruised area extending over the upper part of the abdomen. He was put to bed, treated for shock, grew weaker and died.

An autopsy showed a crushing of the abdominal wall across the upper part, a crushing and laceration of the liver, spleen and right kidney and also a rupture of the stomach.

A "Booze" Party

A strong odor of hard liquor still persisted in the court house last Saturday morning as the result of the wet party held in the basement Friday afternoon at two o'clock.

Several ministers and representatives of the W. C. T. U., newspaper men, court house attaches and trustees around the jail were present for the occasion.

The stuff captured in raids and arrest for some years past was dumped into the sewer, but as yet we have heard of no fish starting a fight with anglers who may have caught them on a hook in an inebriated condition.

Sixty-seven gallons of moonshine and 106 pints of beer were spilled. Five gallons of mash, a 90-gallon and a 125-gallon still and one pressure tank were also destroyed.

Deputy Sheriff Osmond is installing a card index system in the prohibition department of the sheriff's office, and a record of all liquor brought in and locked up, with a number corresponding to that on the bottle, will enable the officers to keep an accurate check and know that the stuff is all present and accounted for the next time a "booze" party is staged in the court house basement. That does not mean that any of it was gone this time, but that the prohibition law enforcement efforts are to be more thoroughly systematized.

Confiscated Fourteen Fish Nets

Last Friday night deputy game wardens under the supervision of C. A. Hearing and C. S. Townsend made a raid on Rogue river and picked up 15 illegal nets. Previous to this there had been a good many complaints received relative to the illicit fishing in the stream. As soon as the opportunity came the wardens made their raid and the nets were seized.

No arrests were made, due principally to the fact that it was a stormy night and the nets were left unattended. There were not many fish in the nets, most of them containing none at all.

The raid was the culmination of a great amount of secret investigation and careful planning which by no means was done in a single day. The hardest part of the undertaking was to get into the waters being fished without the fishermen knowing they were to be visited. The fishermen are so well organized that any stranger seen in the territory on any pretext whatever may be the cause of all the nets being taken up and kept out of the water as long as the man may

stay in the vicinity or until his actual intentions or purpose are discovered.

The story printed in a Bay paper that some of the nets were stolen from the wardens is entirely erroneous as all of them were brought safely to Coquille in two cars. Several hundred dollars are represented by the nets captured.

NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 322, passed by the Common Council of the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, on the 4th day of February, 1929, entitled, "An ordinance levying and declaring an assessment against the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, benefitted by the reconstruction and repair of that portion of the First Street sewer, in the City of Coquille, County of Coos, State of Oregon, herein described in maps, plans, resolutions, ordinances, estimates and proceedings, on file herein, and directing the City Recorder to enter a statement thereof, in the Docket of City Liens, and declaring an emergency."

An assessment was declared against the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land benefitted by the reconstruction and repair of that portion of First Street sewer as follows to-wit: Commencing at a manhole, which bears South 1 deg. 53 min. East 141.35 feet, from the Southwest Corner of Front and Hall Streets; thence South 20 deg. 38 min. West 175.91 feet; thence in a Southwesterly direction according to the maps, plans and surveys of said sewer to the Coquille River. All within the boundaries of the assessment district created for the purpose of the repair and reconstruction of said portions of said sewer, which said district and the boundaries thereof, are described as follows: Beginning at the Northwest Corner of Lot 11, in Block 19 in Elliott's Addition to Coquille City, County of Coos, State of Oregon, and running thence South to Southwest corner of lot 7 in said Block 19; thence west to the Southwest corner of lot 6 in said Block; thence in a Northwesterly direction to the intersection of the South line of First Street and the West line of Hall Street; thence Westerly along the South line of First Street to the Northeast corner of lot 8 in Block 3 in the original town of Coquille City, Coos County, Oregon, as platted by T. B. Willard; thence Southerly to the Southeast corner of said lot 8; thence Easterly, parallel to the South line of First Street 50 feet; thence Southerly parallel to the East line of said original town of Coquille City for a distance of 440 feet; thence Easterly parallel to the South line of Front Street to the intersection with the West line of Hall Street extended South; thence North along said South extension of the West line of Hall Street to the intersection with the South line extended Westerly of Block

A statement of said assessment was entered in the Docket of City Liens on the 8th day of February, 1929, and the same with said ordinance, containing the names of the owners, descriptions of property assessed, and the amount of assessments, against each lot, part of lot and parcels of land, is on file with the City Recorder and subject to inspection by all persons interested and are hereby made a part of this Notice by reference.

That the whole cost of said improvement is the sum of \$1,994.34.

Now Therefore, all persons interested will take Notice that said assessments are due and payable and if not paid within thirty (30) days from the 8th day of February, 1929, or bonded within the time provided by law, to-wit: on or before the 11th day of March, 1929, the same shall be deemed to be delinquent and will bear interest from said date at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, and the said property so assessed will be sold in a manner provided by law for the collection of delinquent assessments.
