Sanford.The meeting was well attended and  
much interest and enthusiasm was evi-

church dining room.C. F. Swander, state secretary of  
the Church of Christ, was present and  
preached at the regular service at  
11 a. m., taking the place of B. L.  
Hicks, who has resigned to accept a  
call from Oakland, Oregon, which he  
had to fill at once.W. G. Mosely, of Spokane, who is  
the Bible school expert for the North-  
west District consisting of seven  
states, gave a short talk at the close  
of the Bible school hour and after  
lunch gave a splendid address on the  
Bible school's needs and how to make  
the schools more effective.In the afternoon church session the  
subject was the "Great Commission"  
and T. B. MacDonald, of Myrtle Point;  
Mr. Phillip, of Marshfield; Mr. Foster,  
of North Bend; and C. F. Swander, of

## Coos County Chamber

At the Coos County Chamber of  
Commerce meeting held in Myrtle  
Point, Monday evening, A. K. Peck,  
of Marshfield, was elected president;  
Herbert Brown, of Bandon, vice presi-  
dent; J. E. Norton, of Coquille, treas-  
urer; and L. D. Felsheim, of Bandon,  
secretary. Miss Aileen Wilson, of  
Coquille, was re-appointed recording  
secretary.A highway department of the cham-  
ber was named, consisted of J. E.  
Norton, C. R. Wade and H. G. Kern.The need for a bonded warehouse  
in Coos county was suggested by Ly-  
man Carrier and a committee to at-  
tempt to secure a privately owned one  
will probably be named.To help arrange entertainment for  
the State Grange, which meets in  
Marshfield in June, a committee con-  
sisting of Earl Cooley, Jas. T. Jen-  
kins, E. R. Peterson and H. E. Hess,  
was named.It was reported that Coos county  
will appropriate \$35 per month to-  
ward the expense of securing data on  
flood control, which is one of the  
chamber's major projects.The recreational booklet for Coos  
county is to be published as soon as  
the several chambers have approved  
the draft of it now ready, at an ex-  
pense of not to exceed \$750. Upon its  
completion attention will be centered  
on the agricultural booklet for which  
each chamber will be asked to sub-  
scribe \$125, and Marshfield \$250.
