Strawberries Early and Late

If you like strawberries—and who doesn't—and want to plant some that will bear fruit after the usual season in the farm garden plant one of the so-called ever-bearing varieties, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These produce berries under favorable conditions, in late summer and fall until hard frosts occur and again in early summer of the following year. To get a good yield of fruit the first year, plants of an ever-bearing variety should be set in early spring, as soon as the ground is in good condition and the blossoms kept off till July. A fertile soil with good moisture supply is essential.
