gestion that the use of bathtubs during the summer be taboo in Coquille, as a means of conservation.

C. T. Skeels, president of the Flower Lovers Club, considered the banquet the best meeting held in Coquille for years, on account of the spirit of co-operation shown.

The Flower Lovers Club, he said, was the youngest in organization in the city, with 180 members and no dues; told of its flower shows and the newly organized Sunshine Club; and declared the need of paint and well-kept parkings one of the city's shortcomings. He meant house paint, he said, and not facial.

Referring to the Woman's Club he said its president was too modest, that she should have told of their efforts in beautifying the court house grounds, and praised their plans for gateway pillars for the city. These will be installed this year. He also suggested a rock garden for the high school grounds where it slopes down to the highway.

Introduced by Mr. Skeels as a man who was doing a great deal to make Coquille a more beautiful home city, Geo. W. Taylor, Sr., spoke for a few moments on the need for city restrictions in the planting of shrubbery and trees in parkings. There should never be trees planted where they would obstruct the view at corner parkings, and the uniformity of tree plantings along each street should be observed.

W. V. Ferguson was introduced as a man who was teaching children "how to think, not what to think." And his first suggestion was for an open window to let some of the hot air out!

Coquille needs fewer shacks and fewer resorts of a questionable nature. Mr. Ferguson declared, and it does need pasteurized milk. He then devoted his allotted time to the latter subject.

Pasteurizing milk is to raise it to a temperature of 140 degrees or slightly more and keeping it there until all deleterious germs have been killed. Diseases which have frequently been traced to impure milk are septic sore throat, tuberculosis, typhoid and scarlet fever. Another fever—the undulant or Malta fever—is caused by milk from cattle suffering from contagious abortion.

No matter how cleanly the milk dealer may keep his equipment or how sanitary the dairyman may keep his stables, milking machine, etc., there is always the possibility that in some manner the attendant may contaminate the supply, or milk from one cow, not tuberculin and abortion tested, may pollute an entire dealer's supply.

Mr. Ferguson stated that a local dealer contemplated installing pasteurization equipment and while he did not mention the name, he hoped the public would accept the milk that had been made safe.

Mrs. Martha E. Mulkey, county school superintendent, said she had been greatly interested in the Junior Flower Club and the Library talks. "We are all responsible for the boys and girls of our community, and whether they are sent to penal institutions or grow up to become leading, respectable citizens," was her preface to a plea for co-operation on the part of all citizens with the constituted authorities in attempting to put a stop to tobacco and liquor selling to boys and girls. Her thought was that we are all equally responsible for allowing conditions which start the young boy or girl downward.

Mrs. Chase was enthusiastic over the many splendid talks given during the evening, and after thanking the speakers, suggested to Mayor Berg that he arrange for such another get-together affair in the course of three or four months.

spected the County Jail of Coos County and find the same in splendid condition both as respects the inmates, food served and all details of the jail. We notice with pride that the cells and steel work in the jail have been remodelled so that at present Coos County can adequately and safely take care of its prisoners. The Jailor, Mr. Harold Varney, and his wife, are to be commended for their management.

Your Grand Jury has further visited and inspected the County Farm under the able management of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McNelly. We enjoyed a splendid dinner at that institution and are pleased to report that the inmates living there are well provided for and under happy surroundings. Likewise we feel that Mr. and Mrs. McNelly should be commended and congratulated on their splendid work at the County Farm making it appear more like a home than a county institution. We have only one recommendation to make, in so far as this institution is concerned, and that is that there should be more fire extinguishers placed in the various buildings.

It is the further recommendation of this Grand Jury and the sincere wish thereof that this and previous recommendations be carried out; that all future Grand Juries shall continue to investigate the handling of the County funds particularly in so far as the expenditures are concerned and this investigation should extend to the County Court and Sheriff's Office.

In closing we feel that our previous investigation was a preliminary one and that if the county is to be materially benefitted these investigations should be continued.

As far as the facts stated in regard to Mr. Jenkins' official acts are concerned, it is not probable that Mr. Jenkins himself would deny any of them. But as to their consisting of a reason for his resignation from office, it is probable that just as many voters who placed him in that position can be found to protest against his resignation as there are those who hold the same views that the grand jury does, and possibly there are more of them.

There are considerable grounds for argument that the facts cited do not give a valid excuse for demanding his ejection from the county court, and unless a more serious charge can be brought against him it is doubtful that any attempt to remove him could succeed.

While the Coquille High basketball squad did not get off to a winning start, and may not win a game in the League A schedule this year, the boys are winding up the season in a blaze of glory, and as it is the first year for nearly all of them they give promise of making a better record the next two or three years.

Last Friday evening the husky Roseburg squad, anticipating nothing much save a practice game, were held to a 16-12 score. Coquille crowded them all the way, getting the jump at the opening toss off by scoring two points, and scoring another basket before the visitors rang the bell. At the half Roseburg was leading 9-8.

Tuesday night at the Community Building here, the local quint threw a big scare into the Myrtle Point contingent, which is fighting desperately to win the League A championship. Coquille scored the first counter and at the half the score was tied 2-2.

In the last half Coquille was leading 8-6 at one time but a couple of lucky baskets in the last few minutes enabled the visitors to win, 12-10.

It was a game remarkably free from fouls.

The Coquille boys were the equal of their opponents in checking and basket shooting, their most noticeable shortcoming being the failure to break quickly enough when they secured the ball. They would hesitate to allow their mates to get organized and Myrtle Point thus was enabled to get organized in defensive position.

The playing squad of Coquille is composed of Lorenz, Chard, Pulford, Seeley and Ellingson, with Miller as substitute, and they have made greater progress since the season's opening than any high school team has here in years.

Mark M. Scott was confined in the county jail here Monday, his parole having been revoked. He was sentenced on a non-support charge.

One Way to Recover Car

Jack Delaney, who claimed to be a special officer of Alameda county, California, was arrested yesterday morning at the Bay, charged with possession of five gallons of liquor.
