House Cleaning Time in the Garden

Three things of vital importance to the future beauty of your garden may be accomplished best at this season of the year. Listed in the order that they can be best accomplished by the average city or suburban gardener, they are pruning, spraying and fertilizing.

In pruning deciduous ornamental shrubbery, and by the term "deciduous," I mean those plants that drop their leaves in the fall, we must take into consideration the period of flowering. Those plants that produce their blooms on one year old wood during the early spring months should not be cut back until a short time after the blooming period, for it is obvious that pruning at any other time would destroy the base upon which the blooms are produced. A light pruning after the plant has enlivened the landscape with its profusion of flowers, will stimulate a healthy growth of new wood upon which the blooms are produced the following spring. In this group, are many of the popular varieties: Spiraea Van Houttei, weigelia, Forsythia, lilac, viburnum, and wisteria, as well as many others.

All deciduous shrubs that bloom during the summer month on growth of the same year, or those that are non-flowering, can be advantageously pruned at this time. In this class are included such well-known and popular plants as hydrangea, Philadelphia, or mock orange, hibiscus, and all varieties of roses.

With most shrubs, during the first one or two years they should be given a light pruning and in subsequent years all dead or diseased wood should be removed and burned; care being taken not to destroy the natural beauty of the plant. With rose bushes, it is somewhat different as they should be given a rather severe pruning at the time of setting and in following years it is a good rule to prune back one-third of all new growth, removing suckers from around the roots, as well as any branches which mar their shapely beauty.

Conifer evergreens do not require as much attention in the matter of pruning as do the deciduous varieties, where the pruning is done more to keep the plant within bounds or to enable it to hold its symmetrical shape and blend into the landscape plan to best advantage. Care should be taken not to head these shrubs back so as to destroy the terminal bud, preventing further height growth, which, of course, will eventually ruin it as a tree. Broad-leaved evergreens are pruned in much the same manner as deciduous shrubs.

While nearly all ornamental shrubs or trees are materially benefited by proper pruning, it is especially important that fruit trees should be pruned the year they are planted, the object being to establish a balance between the top and the roots.

Spraying offers the only effective means of control and prevention of various plant diseases and pests. The application of suitable insecticides or fungicides at the proper season of the year is the best insurance for a bounteous yield or a continuance of beautiful shrubbery as the case may be. The spraying process should follow the work of pruning as trees properly pruned can be sprayed much more effectively and with the use of less material than unpruned trees.

The dormant spray, being a general all around clean up spray must be thoroughly done, care being taken that the solution completely covers all bark from top to bottom. Additional precautions must be taken of rough bark to insure penetration into any crevasses, which might harbor insects or their eggs. For dormant spray, we recommend the use of lime sulphur. In making lime sulphur solution you will find it more satisfactory to use dry lime and sulphur, adding a little water at a time until it is about the consistency of cream, and then adding additional water to bring it to the desired strength. For dormant spray one pound of dry lime and sulphur to three gallons of water is recommended. Better results can be obtained with this solution, if about one-half cup of soft soap is added, made by the use of one ounce of ordinary laundry soap, as this acts as a spreader that will help carry the spray to all part of the tree.

The amount of spray material necessary to effectively cover a given number of trees and shrubs varies, of course, with the individual and equipment used, but as a general rule one gallon of mixture for the average tree is a safe estimate.

There are many types of spray pumps on the market ranging in price from 50 cents up, but it is advisable to get one that will give lasting as well as satisfactory service,

for this will be most economical in the long run.

After pruning and spraying we must look to the fertilization of our soil, if we are to receive the maximum yield of fruits, vegetables, or a profusion of beautiful shrubbery or flowers.

Permanent flower beds such as perennials and shrubbery, that occupy the same soil year after year should receive a generous application of fertilizer, mixing it into the soil as much as possible. For annual gardens fertilizer should be applied each spring, spading it in well before planting your flowers. For your tulips and other bulbs use a top dressing of bone meal, which will help them make large, vivid colored flowers, with long stems. The type of fertilizer to be used naturally must depend upon the condition of the soil and the kind of plants.

Lists Seven Problems

Imminent in Dairying

Seven important economic problems face the dairy industry today and it is the job of the scientist and teacher to lead in their solution. K. L. Hatch, assistant director of agricultural extension at the University of Wisconsin, told the American Dairy Science association, at its recent meeting in Madison. His list of subjects, toward which more research should be directed, consists of economy of production, herd testing, recognition of quality, establishment of a new set of standards for dairy products, packaging of cheese, and the use of electricity.

"Each of these problems is imminent," he declared, "and should challenge both branches of dairying—production and manufacturing. They are economic problems and can only be solved with facts which are not now obtainable."

In research experiments, more emphasis should be centered on such factors as labor costs, dry cow expenses, depreciated herd costs, bull costs, and capital charges, such as interest, taxes, insurance, and depreciation.

In dairy manufacturing, uneconomical practices still prevail, Hatch said. Small, ununitary, and wholly inefficient plants are the rule, and little effort is made to give to the consumer the type of product which appeals to his taste.

Dairy Facts

Most cream separators will do a much better job of skimming the milk when it is warm.

The herd bull should be tied up or penned away from the herd until, at least, November 1, as it is very important to avoid having cows freshen during the warm months.

The usual farm-grown ration does not contain enough protein for a good milk-producing ration. For instance, a ration made up of mixed hay, corn silage, cornmeal, oats and bran is lacking in protein, but contains an excess of carbohydrates and fat.

When the milking is done by machine, the rubber tubes and teat cups, after washing, should be placed in a disinfectant solution, allowed to soak until the next milking, and then rinsed out again with clean water before use.

By using pure-bred bulls it is possible to build a herd of scrub cattle into a high quality herd. This has been demonstrated at the South Dakota State college experiment station through approximately 15 years' investigation.

Frozen in Hot Spell
