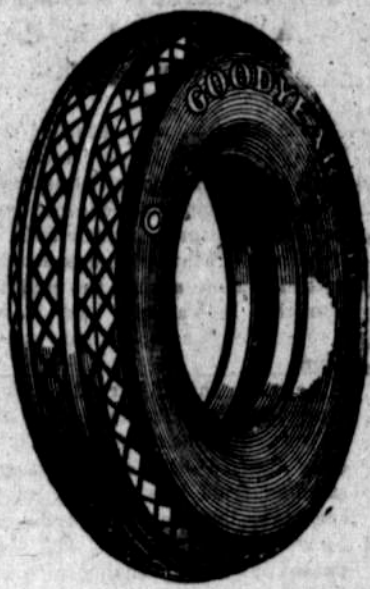

Ashore North of the Bay

Hope has practically been abandoned of saving the steamer, Sujameco, which went ashore in the fog six miles north of Coos Bay last Friday morning, and the only hope of floating her seemed to be to dredge the sand from around her so that the boat would float where she lies, and it is not certain that that would do it.

The Sujameco is one of the larger boats which made regular trips to Coos Bay and was coming in for a cargo of lumber.

Capt. J. F. Carlson and a crew of 32 were on the vessel when she stranded. The boat is now parallel to the shore and all attempts to pull her back into deep water have failed.

Coquille Hi Did Not Enter

The members of the Coquille high school basketball squad decided not to enter the tournament at Marshfield today and tomorrow, which will decide which team shall represent southwestern Oregon at the state tournament at Salem.
