ORDER

WHEREAS, Section 38, Chapter 153,
Laws of 1921, provide that the Oregon
State Game Commission may at its
discretion, and at such time, and un-
der such regulations as it may adopt,
permit the taking and sale of any
game animals, game birds or game
fish, the sale of which is otherwise
prohibited by this section;

THEREFORE, by authority of law
vested in said Oregon State Game
Commission under Section 38, Chapter
153, Laws of 1921, it is hereby order-
ed that the fish known as striped bass,
inhabiting the water of Coos River
from the City limits of Marshfield to
the established dead line, may be
taken for the purpose of sale from
April 1st to June 30th of any year,
under the following regulations; pro-
vided, however, that no bass shall be
taken in any of the other inlets of
Coos Bay;

FIRST—That each and every
striped bass so taken and sold during
such specified period of time shall be
tagged with a tag furnished by said
Oregon State Game Commission by
any deputy game warden, or some
person authorized by said Commission
to tag same, at the rate of five (5)
cents per fish.

SECOND—That each and every
person, firm or corporation taking and
selling such striped bass shall keep a
complete record showing the number
of such fish taken and the number
sold and the weight thereof, and to
whom sold; and within five days from
the expiration of this Order shall file
with the Oregon State Game Com-
mission a written statement showing
all operations of such person, firm or
corporation under this Order.
