Mr. Moomaw shipped six tons of artichokes to Corvallis to be processed at the State College before shipment to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where they will be manufactured into artichoke products. It is an experiment with Mr. Moomaw. He finds the cost of harvesting by hand and the cost of shipping so far to the factory will eat up his profits, but with proper machinery for handling and a factory in Coos county, the industry can be made to bring in greater dividends than any other type of agriculture. Mr. Moomaw thinks the artichoke will some day double and quadruple the income of the farmers of Coos county. This soil and climate are ideal for this product and there is certainly no limit to the coming demand for artichoke products. The sugar of the artichoke contains the newly discovered element now used in the cure of the dreaded disease diabetes. The artichoke has other curative properties. It is a member of the sunflower family and takes a large portion of growth directly from the air. It is one of the least exhausting crops to the soil. The land can be recropped indefinitely.

Officers Exonerated

The inquest held at Langlois last Thursday and Friday to inquire into the death of Chas. Pearson, moonshiner, killed at Floras Lake, Wednesday evening by prohibition officers, resulted in a verdict at 9 o'clock Friday night that Pearson's death was caused by a bullet from the gun of E. E. Oakes, one of the raiding officers. The officers were exonerated of all blame.
