All Bouts Were Good
On Legion Boxing Card

Announcement was made at the American Legion boxing card Tuesday evening that the Coquille American Legion will present another attraction in the near future at which it is hoped to have George Dixon, Portland scrapper, meet some man in his class for the main event.

The card Tuesday night was the best presented here in a long time. Many fans were heard to say that they had received their money's worth at the end of the second match, in which case they only paid half fare, for the last three bouts were just as good as the first two.

In the 30-minute wrestling match Glen Nolan, of Marshfield, showed more experience at the game than did his younger opponent, "Poison Ivy" Lamb, of Eugene. Apparently he was permitting Lamb to put any hold on him just for the pleasure of breaking it, and only once was he in danger of losing a fall. Lamb worked Nolan into a position where he secured a hold on each foot and after swinging Nolan around for several revolutions was just about to drop him for the fall when he himself fell and lost the advantage.

Nolan was just in the act of forcing Lamb's shoulders to the mat when the 30 minute bell rang and Referee Hunt called the match a draw. Both men were fast and put up a first class exhibition.

"Pinkey" Smith and Mart Pierson started their four-round match at a clip which early had them both tired out. By the second round both boys were ready to let the other one lead, but they gamely kept at it until "Pinkey's" second throw in the towel near the end of the fourth canto. Pierson had a great advantage in height and reach and was able to protect himself by a straight left from many of Smith's whirlwind attacks.

Neither in this bout or those succeeding was anyone cut up or greatly punished, although there was plenty of action in each fight and the fans appreciated these facts. The average ring follower does not care for blood and injury, but he likes to see clever boxing and good punching and the crowd got just that Tuesday night.

"Red" Brown, of Coquille, substituting for Ellsworth Willett, of Lee, was awarded a draw in his match with "Red" Anderson, of Marshfield. Brown held his own with the fast Bay scrapper and was just as fresh as Anderson when their fight ended.

Tommy Williams, of North Bend, received quite a surprise in his match with Young Judd, of Roseburg, who went on in place of Ken Draper, who failed to show up. "Judd" was the nom de guerre of a former Coquille boy who has just passed his 18th birthday, and who has been in the boxing game for several months. He did not force the fighting but had a defense that Tommy could not overcome and once floored the clever little North Bend scrapper when the latter rushed him. Tommy took a lot of hard punches, too, but as this was his first fight since last September he was not in quite as good form as heretofore. Referee Scott's announcement that it was a draw was agreed with by those present.

Cal Olson, of Eugene, lost the decision to Bud Bryant, of Coquille, after 10 rounds of furious fighting in the main event. For a few moments it looked to be his fight for he put Bud down in the first round, but the latter came back strong and had Olson so groggy in the fourth that a well placed punch would have sent the Eugene boy to dreamland. And again in the eighth he hammered Olson hard but couldn't quite put him down for keeps. Both boys were landing good solid smashes, the kind that jars without cutting, and those who wagered on an early knockout lost. Bud was out-weighted several pounds but made up for it with an exhibition of more clever defense than he has shown before. There were close to 500 present for the bouts, the gross receipts running over \$400.

Coquille Won Two, Lost Two

At least two squads—ten men—from the Coquille Rod & Gun Club membership will journey over to North Bend Sunday and participate in the telegraphic shoot on the North Bend Gun Club's trap grounds. Both North Bend and Marshfield are opponents of Coquille in the shoot Sunday, the other competing club being Nestucca Valley.

A small squad out last Sunday, and poor visibility, kept Coquille from reporting any straight, but the 72 scored was enough to win from Helix and Prineville, the other two being lost to Heppner and Huntington.

C. of C. Budget Adopted—
Improvements in Park

Complying with a suggestion made by a dairyman living near Coquille, the Chamber of Commerce board of directors Wednesday evening, decided to have the chamber's headquarters in the hotel act as an employment agency to this extent—the secretary will list the names of farmers and dairymen who desire help during the rush season of haying and silo filling, and will also keep a list of the names of men who desire such jobs. Any farmer can avail himself of this service by applying to the secretary.

The directors voted unanimously to approve the local American Legion Post's plans for holding a Fourth of July celebration in Coquille.

A committee consisting of W. A. Zosel, O. T. Gant and Dr. P. M. Drake was named by President J. L. Stevens to wait on the county court and suggest the securing of more parking space at the court house by travelling between the curb and the sidewalk for the entire block on the east side.

The building committee, Messrs. G. Russell Morgan and A. N. Gould, reported that they had investigated possibilities at the Community Building, and recommended the establishment of four toilets, two in the north east corner of the building and two at the rear end of the exhibit addition to the main building.

The plan was approved by the directors and the committee was authorized to appear before the council Monday night to ascertain if the city would assist in the installation. It was pointed out that a playground and park should be provided with such accommodations and they are necessities. The cost of providing the improvement was estimated at between \$300 and \$400.

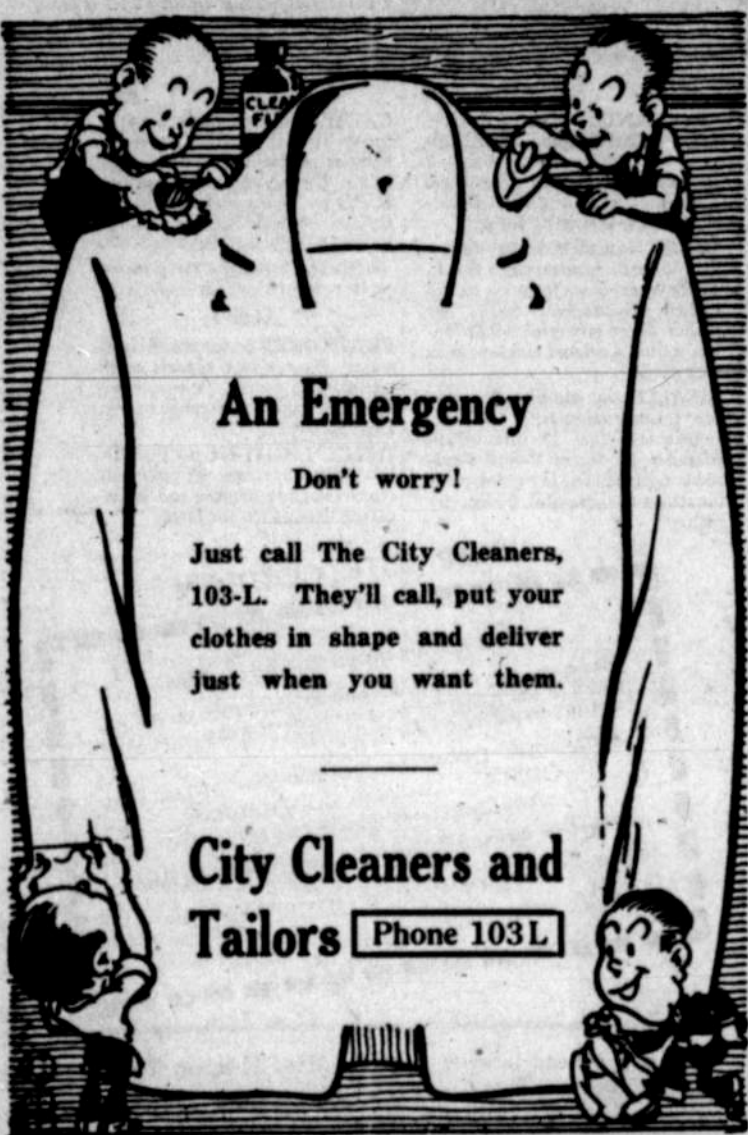
