County Court This Week

The county court, in session this week, acted on a number of indigent and widows claims for allowances, granting the following: \$15 a month to G. H. Barrett, of North Bend; \$15 a month to Eltha Alice Dayton, of Marshfield; \$15 a month to Mrs. Ella Sloancker, of North Bend; \$10 a month to Mabel Smith, of Bandon; and \$30 a month to Mrs. Mammie Essie Crouch, of Coquille.

Claims for the death of sheep killed by dogs were allowed as follows: Ben Gant, \$297.50 for 33 head; G. E. Trott, \$120 for 12 head; Geo. Erdman, \$25 for 5 lambs; Roy F. Garrett, \$10 for one sheep.

Action on the petition of E. H. Kern for a salary of \$150 a month as county surveyor, and for sufficient funds to equip his office with the necessary instruments, was postponed for 60 days, or until the law passed by the recent legislature regarding county surveyor's salaries becomes effective.

The court found it necessary to transfer \$9,087.50 from the general fund to the market road fund and ordered it done. It was also ordered that funds be transferred from the various road districts to the market road maintenance fund, as follows: \$825 from No. 19; \$700 from No. 14; \$225 from No. 37; \$200 from No. 5; \$300 from No. 11; \$200 from No. 23; \$800 from No. 12; \$200 from No. 17; \$200 from No. 16; \$325 from No. 38; \$600 from No. 43 and \$745 from No. 28.

New River Fishermen Acquitted

In the case of R. A. Jeub and Cecil Daggar vs. Geo. H. Chaney in Circuit court this week, the jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiffs for the full amount claimed—\$4,171.36—and attorneys' fees and costs.

The verdict of the jury in the New river fishing case, wherein the state was endeavoring to convict L. E. Osborne of fishing in a closed stream, pretty well establishes the fact that New river will have to be considered a part of Floras lake, unless the legislature makes the distinction definite. Two brothers, old residents took opposite stands in their testimony, one claiming the river was a separate stream and the other that it was not. And it was the same with all the witnesses, both plaintiff and defendant having testimony in support of their claims.

Mr. Cornell was acquitted, and Deputy Warden C. C. Townsend, who was here for the trial, says he will not again interfere with anyone fishing in what the Game Commission designates as New river.

Injured by Rolling Log

Bert Mead, North Fork rancher, suffered fracture of three ribs, which were torn from the breast bone when a log rolled over him Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Mead was assisting G. M. Parker in rolling logs off the latter's land into the river, when one of the logs got a start and Mr. Mead was unable to clear the track in time and the log knocked him down and rolled over him. Fortunately the accident occurred on plowed and soft ground. Mr. Mead's head was pushed down into the soft soil, but he suffered no other injuries aside from those stated.—Myrtle Point Herald.

Three Desire Citizenship

Three declarations of intention to apply for citizenship papers have been filed with County Clerk Watson the past week:

Johann Martens, of Lakeside, 45 years of age, is a native of Germany and came to the U. S. in 1925. His wife is also a native of Germany and came to this country at the same time. Adamine B. Kimball, of Marshfield, 35 years of age, was born in Scotland and arrived in New York City, Sept. 27, 1926.

Two Taken to Pen

Robert Green and Bud McGowan were taken out to Salem by Deputy Sheriff Frank Osmond and "Curley" Richardson last Friday, and are now serving time in the big house, the former with a life sentence penalty, and McGowan facing a ten-year confinement. The only incident of the trip was when the Hudson they were driving went into the ditch, near the county line, and it required a tractor to pull them out. The car did not turn over.

Wardens Patrolling Willamette

Deputy Game Wardens A. M. Fish and C. A. Hearing have been part of the crew of nine men who have been patrolling the Willamette river for the past two weeks, endeavoring to catch "bootleg" fishermen. Mr. Hearing came home Tuesday morning for the New river fishing case in Circuit court, but expects to return for further duty on the Willamette.

Coquille Won From Bay Teams

The North Bend Gun Club pulled a good one on a Coquille squad at the shoot over there last Sunday, but it didn't take long for the boys to tumble. After all had shot in the telegraphic contest, the trap began to throw floaters that hardly sailed like a blue rock, but had the appearance of a regulation clay pigeon. But none of them broke and when Ed Lorenz hit one so hard that it dropped against a stump and still did not break, the stunt was off. Targets of myrtlewood do not break easily.

There was a large crowd in attendance at the gun club grounds, just off the Skyline Boulevard, with a fine lunch for all. But the shooting was off. Twenty-three was the high score of the day, and such marksmen as Fred McNelly, Pete Miller and Earl Graham, broke 22 or less.

Coquille won its contest with Marshfield and North Bend, by scoring three 24's before going over to the Bay but lost the third contest to Nestucca Bay which turned in a straight 75. This leaves Coquille standing at .667—twelve wins and six defeats.

Next Sunday the locals shoot against Pendleton-Athens, Central Douglas county and Washington county—Roseburg and Hillsboro.

Individual scores last Sunday were: Fred McNelly 22, "Pat" Collier 20, Earl Graham 22, Pete Miller 19, Cal Ray 24, Fred Hudson 24, Ira Johnson 24, Geo. Lorenz 21, G. Earl Low 24, Roy Abbott 15, A. J. Sherwood 20, Bert Berg 19, W. B. Farmer 20, Alton Grimes 22, R. B. Miller 20, Earl Woodyard 20, Chas. Baer 19.

This is an off-year for the local gun club and there is no chance, with only three more Sundays on the schedule, to come near the top as has been the case in previous years. Coquille won the preliminary championship and the small trophy cup in 1928, and in 1927 they won the big cup of the telegraphic shoot-off at Portland.

Track Manager Chosen

The school principals of the county have through correspondence unanimously agreed that H. W. Lever, coach at the union high school at Myrtle Point, be asked to act as manager for the Grade Track and Field Meet which will be held shortly before the close of school. Mr. Lever managed the track last year and handled it in such a splendid manner that the school people are eager to secure his services again. The date of the Track Meet has not been set as yet.

Says Habits of Mind to Be Changed by Radio

Radio is going to change the mind of man, declares Sir Philip G. the British writer, who believes that radio is going to give man a mastery over life beyond previous dreams.

"Here again the scientists have presented new opportunities to humanity which will surely alter their scheme of life, their habits of mind, their social customs and pleasures almost as much as the alteration of material conditions which are now awaiting them," he writes in Hears's International Cosmopolitan.

"Again we stand only on the threshold of a new age, and yet already we are conscious of newly revealed wonders which in the old days would have been thought miraculous and are indeed taking us into a region beyond mere matter in the sanctuaries of eternal force."

Radio has already opened up new vistas of knowledge, according to Sir Philip, and has given to people wide sympathies in life and put them into touch with other countries and minds.

"Perhaps those are high words to use about an invention which is called wireless or radio," he adds, "so common now after a few years of use, that most of us have a wireless aerial over our chimney pots. One must not underrate the effect even now on the human mind caused by this broadcasting habit which has taken hold of life. One may only hope that it will be less vulgarized by some of its transmitters."

"We are still at the beginning of this new knowledge. Marconi's beam system of wireless telephony is already past its experimental stage: It is now possible to focus the ordinary wireless rays upon a particular locality with such directness that when sent from England to Canada or Australia they may be received only over an area of something like fifty square miles. The world will become one universal telephone exchange with millions of conversations crossing each other through space in every direction."
