Dorsey Kreitzer Passes Away

Dorsey Kreitzer, for 22 years a
resident of Marshfield, passed away
at his home there Monday afternoon,
after an illness of more than a year.
Funeral services were held at the
Thuerwacher funeral parlors, Wed-
nesday at 4 p. m., and the body was
taken to Portland that evening for in-
terment.

Mr. Kreitzer was a man highly re-
garded by his associates and friends
and built a reputation for himself
during his residence on the Bay that
everyone might envy.

Dorsey Montgomery Kreitzer was
born in Farmville, Montgomery coun-
ty, Ohio, on April 6, 1874. He was
engaged in active law practice since
the year 1895 when he was associated
with his father, practicing law at
Dayton, Ohio. He remained with his
father until July, 1901, at which time
he went to Oklahoma where with his
father-in-law, William Grimes, he en-
tered the banking business. His mar-
riage to Flo Grimes occurred in Okla-
homa and his only child, William
Grimes Kreitzer, was born there.

In 1907 Mr. Kreitzer came to Coos
Bay and became associated as cashier
with the First Trust and Savings
Bank being in business with M. C.
Horton, William Grimes, J. S. Coke,
and W. S. Chandler. He was made
cashier when the old First Trust and
Savings Bank consolidated with the
First National Bank of Coos Bay. In
1915 he was elected vice president of
the First National Bank, holding this
position until his death.

For 22 years Mr. Kreitzer remain-
ed in the banking business in Marsh-
field, and was known as one of the
leading banking men in this section
and in the state of Oregon. When a
young man, it had been Mr. Kreitzer's
ambition to become a lawyer, and he
graduated and passed the bar exam-
ination in Ohio only later to follow
banking in Oklahoma. He came to
Coos Bay for the sole purpose of get-
ting into the banking business after
being out of it for several years in
Oklahoma.

Coquille Wins Opener

From Myrtle Point, 5-4

The Valley-Bay baseball league
opened the season last Sunday under
most auspicious circumstances, all of
the games being closely contested
and a fine brand of ball presented for
the fans. Coquille defeated Myrtle
Point, 5-4; Marshfield won from Cot-
tage Grove, 2-1 in ten innings; and
Eugene shut out Bandon 3-0.

Coquille opened the season by win-
ning from a revamped Myrtle Point
team that threw a scare into local
fans and not until Rice's home run in
the fifth, driving Heath and Marlow
in ahead of him did the Loggers tie
the score. Myrtle Point got the jump
in the first when a walk to Dey, a
hit by Mack and what would have
been a home run by Manning, had he
touched second base, scored two runs.

Pillsbury walked four men and was
touched for four hits in the three
innings he worked and gave way in
the fourth to Carl Gilbert who shut
the visitors out without a hit until
the ninth when Wade and Poland
singled but failed to score. Gillie's
submarine was not up to mid-summer
form but he had enough stuff, backed
by good fielding, to hold the Pointers
safe.

Chief Manning, who pitched for
Myrtle Point is one-sweet tosser. He
used his head as well as his arm.
struck out eleven and with perfect
fielding back of him would have won
the game 4-2. Mack, his catcher, is
good, too, if he will overcome his
habit of pulling the ball over, in an
attempt to fool the umpire.

After two were out in the first,
"Duke" Marlow landed on one of the
chief's slants for a three-bag blow
between center and right, and scored
on Eddie Foss' single.

The winning run was scored in the
ninth when "Lefty" Brown was al-
lowed second base. His blow to short
was fielded slowly and bounced off
Dey's glove at first. A boy picked it
up and tossed it to Dey and Umpire
Richardson gave Brown another base
for the interference. He went home
on Foss' single.

For the first game both teams
showed up in good shape and played
snappy ball.

A crowd of around 400 witnessed
the game and thoroughly enjoyed the
performance.

Art Berg and Gene Norton are
each accusing the other this week of
being afraid to face him for the
opening ceremony, but the truth is
that Manager Fortier was so anxious
to get the game started he forgot the
advised preliminaries.
