To Enlarge Power Plant

The last issue of the Bylaws News Bulletin, official publication of the corporation which owns the Mt. States Power Co., contains the announcement that authorization has been given for construction of a 10,000 kilowatt addition to the company's generating plant at North Bend.

Construction of this project is expected to be started by August 1 and the schedule calls for completion of the addition by July 1, 1930. This addition will increase the capacity of the present station from 5,000 to 15,000 kilowatts. The present station was built in 1924. The new addition to the Coos Bay station will consist of an addition to the present concrete building to house one 10,000 kilowatt turbine with two boilers of suitable capacity.

Though no definite estimate has been released by company officials, it is shown that the cost of the new addition which will be built on the south side of the present unit, will be at least one and one quarter million dollars.

Projects which are now under way, including the construction of a new standby station, the addition of one boiler and the new power line into Coos Bay from Roseburg, will cost \$700,000, bringing the total expenditure in this district to about \$2,000,000.
