Coffee and cake were served to the guests just before their departure.

The Grand Chief, Mrs. Knight, is making her official visits to this part of the state this month, visiting and instructing Justus Temple of Coquille on the night of the convention, this being the regular meeting night.

Thursday evening Mrs. Knight visited Myrtle Point Temple, Friday night she is to be in North Bend and Saturday night in Bandon.

The case of Coos county vs. Wm. A. Gilbert, demanding the return of \$500 which was presented to him, last year by the county court, will be removed from the docket. Again last Sunday at Bandon, the Coquille Loggers launched a terrific bombardment in one inning and when the smoke cleared away seven hits, three of them doubles, had put six runs across the plate and the game was clinched. They varied their attack on Fred Nightingale, O. S. C. pitcher, by waiting until the seventh inning, the third having previously been the frame for the wrecking crew to do their dirty work. The final score was 8-3.

Until the fifth Bandon's southpaw had been quite effective and only three blows had been secured. Three hits in the fifth and three in the sixth had produced one run in each.

In the seventh Rice singled; Stewart was out for attempting to bunt the third strike and "Lefty" Brown fanned. But Perry Roper and Carl Gilbert followed with clean singles, Heath and Marlow doubled, Foss hit for one bag, and Fortier doubled. Rice ended the carnage by striking out.

Carl Gilbert was never in trouble, although he let up in eighth, with so commanding a lead, and grooved one for Quayle who drove it over the fence, scoring Douglas ahead of him.

The same day Marshfield won from Myrtle Point, 9-7, and Eugene handed Cottage Grove its fifth defeat, 9-5.
