Mr. Albert Seeling gave a very interesting talk Tuesday evening to the club concerning lawns based on his own experience. From a scientific point of view it is injurious to water new lawns five or six times before the grass sprouts, as it makes shallow root growth, instead of the roots growing down deep as they should. Use brush or something on top to shade the ground from the sun instead of watering a new lawn so much.

Winter fertilizing is very necessary and is the proper thing. Also leave the clippings on the lawn. And be sure to mow it often. Such a season as this, twice a week is enough but three times a week is necessary during warm weather.

Raking the lawn once in a while is very good to stimulate growth. But it will make old lawns that never had it done before look shabby for a few weeks. Go over it with the mower again after raking it.

This mowing the lawn often will eventually kill out or discourage all weed growth.

Mr. Lyman Carrier was asked to talk on the care of creeping bent lawns. Top dressing or fertilizing is very good during the winter, he also stated. He finds fifteen or twenty minutes for each spot when watering the lawn is just as well as an hour or two as this locality has its own drainage system and whatever more is put one will drain away any how. We might add that lime should not be used on creeping bent lawn while it benefits the clover lawns.

There is no place where dahlias are so much at home as on the Pacific coast. Today in almost every country in the world they may be found growing in abundance in the best gardens, but it was the western coast of the United States that did the most to bring the modern dahlia to its high standard, and it is here that it deserves to be appreciated. The long growing season makes it possible to get the flowers started without difficulty and the length of their blooming season is the longest of all garden flowers.

There are no secrets in connection with the growing of dahlias well, and almost all growers send out with their orders instructions concerning their culture, which if followed will invariably bring satisfactory results.

1. When is the best time to plant dahlias? For a long season of bloom, the month of April is generally accepted as being the best time to set out dahlia roots, which will give one blooms in July. May planting will bring on the first blooms later, but otherwise is equally satisfactory. Formerly the tendency was to plant too early, now there seems to be an inclination on the part of some to plant too late. In this locality late planting does not necessarily avoid warm weather, for it is often warmer in September than it is in July or August. The blooming season is supposed to be at its height about September first (show time.) Later in the fall, of course, when the days shorten, colors usually deepen, but growth is slower, and it is hardly advisable to plant dahlias generally for late fall flowers only.

2. Is it well to plant dahlias in partial shade? An open, sunny situation can be depended on to give the best results. In the shade in a moderate climate there will not be the rigid plant growth or profusion of bloom that sunny situation will produce. An unusual hot spell which may come once or twice during the season in California may spoil the blooms then on the plants, but if they are removed at once the garden will be fully recovered in a few days. Shade is not the equivalent of those invigorating afternoon fogs experienced right on the ocean shore. In localities where high temperatures are continuous for a long period, shade during the afternoon is necessary ordinarily, and a location in the garden where there is high shade, preferably a tall tree at a distance, is then most suitable, but a sunny location is better along the coast and in the coast valleys.
