turned out to be—oh, there it is on the left. We are cutting across a corner, should pick up Yncalla next. Forest fire to our right, looks like a good one, too.

Looking down on the curve of Rice hill. We won't slide around any of them today.

There we just got another kick in the ear. Where did that one come from.

Bill goes wandering around again—looking for a few alder trees. I guess in case we have to park this baby.

Yncalla over left wing tip. Dandy marked mail field down there.

Whoa! Betsy! not so fast, she is getting playful. That's better, be a good girl and fly straight. I had an early breakfast and I don't think you can get it at this time of day. 11:40. But I am making no brags.

Drain to the left. Spot a road down to coast. That way coming back perhaps. We are now inland from Drain. Headed for Cottage Grove at 11:50. Have to change my map now. Fly easy.

Ask Bill about the altitude, we have 4,000 feet. This altimeter I have is sure on the Fritz, it only reads 2,000.

Bill noses over to look ahead. Thinks I haven't anything to think about I guess. Here we go with more bumps. We are over rough country again. Logging operations to the left. Bill pounds cowl to attract my attention. He points to the three Sisters to the right. Beautiful sight as they rear their snow-capped heads above the haze.

Bill goes wandering around again and not so good in the stomach.

Cottage Grove over right wing. Highway is now to our right. I lose the damn road again. After gawking around. One is excusable for that, though, plenty to look at, and how!

Cottage abeam to right at 12:07. Motor working sweet and hasn't missed a beat that I can tell. Think I would know if anything went haywire.

Cresswell to right. Eugene over left nose.

The man who wrote: "Above the world and the rotten things, One Wings, Wings, Wings," sure knew his air. This is the greatest sport in the world. It one could only fly on, and on, and on.

Have to keep a sharp lookout now and help Bill look for other ships here around E. Don't want a collision way up here. I haven't a chute and I would hate to bail out without one.

There are a million acres to land on down there as level as a floor. A forced landing out here would be pie.

We just passed over the heart of Eugene. Saw the flying field to left at edge of town. A yellow-winged ship parked near hangar. It must be the Hobi and the new Cabin ship.

I took the stick, but couldn't see ahead out of the front cock pit so I shake the stick after a few minutes and hold up my hands. Bill takes back the controls after I wander off course to left. Pass Eugene and off to Albany.

Pretty hazy ahead. 12:36 P. M. and all O. K.

Harrisburg to left. Passing over Halsey at 12:43. Running into heavy haze. Not so good.

Town to left must be Sweet Home or Brownsville.

We will swing east of Albany and Salem. Marion off to wing tip.

Over Willamette River. It's sure beautiful down there. So many small towns now. I will only check by larger towns now. Getting a little bumpy again. A cross wind from the west makes it a little choppy at 1:07.

Waldo hills to left. I can identify Salem, so does Bill, he points to Salem and then his head makes motion of a wheel. That means "nuts" and "crazies." Salem is off our left wing tip now at 1:15 P. M.

We should make Portland by 2:00 P. M.

Can see Hood and Jefferson dimly through the haze.

A million emergency fields.

My pencil is worn out, signing off until we reach Portland.

Pass over Silverton and Mt. Angel Oregon City to right abeam. Identify it by highway bridge.

Over Terwilliger Blvd. Veteran's Hospital to the left.

Portland looks like a toy city.

Here we go down to the island. Making big circle to lose altitude.

Good-bye, we are here. Bill sets her down.

The Coquille Loggers met their Waterloo Sunday when Eugene university boys played them at Athletic park here, dropping the game 8-3, and going into a tie with Marshfield for league leadership.

It was not a fluke victory, either, for the visitors outthrew and outplayed the Loggers and were entitled to the victory, although each team earned three runs.

"Duke" Marlow, playing second which is not his position, was partly responsible for the Eugene runs, for in his anxiety to get the ball in a hurry he booted four hits, but the visitors were hitting Gilbert quite freely and were out to win.

Alexander, who was knocked out of the box by the Loggers at Eugene, pitched an air-tight ball and only once was in trouble. This occurred in the third. Roper had been hit but was out at second on a force play when Gilbert hit to the infield. Gillie was also out on a fielder's choice on Heath's infield blow. Hutt singled and Marlow scored them both with a three-bagger. Bill Fortier caught one of Alexander's shoots squarely and smashed it out to the right field line, but Umpire Oerding called it foul, and Fortier, who had reached third, was out at first on his next try. Whether the ball was fair or foul is a mooted question. To the umpire it appeared foul, but those sitting in cars along the foul line say it was fair by a foot. At any rate the play stopped a Coquille rally which might have won the game.

Rice's home run in the seventh was the only other run as well as hit.

Marshfield kept up its record Sunday by defeating Bandon, 14-2, and Myrtle Point won from Cottage Grove, 8-1.
