Coquille Wins First Half— Defeats Coos Bay, 13-5

The Coquille Loggers clinched the championship for the first half of the Valley-Bay League last Sunday by beating Marshfield decisively, 13-5. In fact, the Pirates were beaten when "Suds" Sutherland walked into the Golden Field to pitch for Coquille, and the old boy had so much stuff that for five of the nine frames he was only throwing six, seven or eight balls in an inning.

Besides "Suds," the Loggers had a classy second baseman, who made a bad heave on his first throw to first, but he more than made up for it during the rest of the game, with some nifty fielding and a well placed two bagger.

There were numerous sidelights to the game, outside the playing, which should be mentioned. In the third inning a foul tip caught Feightinger on the knee and laid him out for a few moments. But he was not seriously hurt and when he singled in the fourth, Brundage wanted to put their best runner on the bag to run for him. "Let Mosier run," was Capt. Fortier's answer, and he had a legal right to designate who the runner should be, but some of the Marshfield fans got the idea that Fortier would not agree to a runner for Feightinger, and their charges of "poor sportsmanship" were entirely unjustified.

A near fight occurred in the fifth inning when Fortier bumped into Feightinger, who is noted for standing in the line and trying to block runners from the plate. When he got up the Marshfield catcher swung at Bill and then tried to cut him with his cleats and did give him a nasty cut on the leg. Fortier let fly with both feet and just missed Feightinger by inches. By that time others had interfered and the scrap was over.

"Duke" Marlow and Allen Rice both planted the ball outside the park for home runs, Marlow's going over the high trees near the bridge, and "Lefty" Brown hit two doubles which would have been good for homers in anything but a band box park. "Lefty" played a whale of a game, with three hard blows and eleven chances accepted without an error.

Coquille scored one in the first when Heath singled, was advanced, by two sacrifice hits, to third, and came in on Fortier's two bagger.

Marshfield scored three in the first. After two were out Brundage singled, Sutherland was safe and went to second on Belleville's wild throw to first, and Feightinger walked. With the bases loaded Miller hit for a triple but died there.

Belleville's double and Marlow's homer scored two in the third, and in the fifth successive hits by Brown, Roper and Heath, a walk to both Belleville and Fortier, and Chapman's glaring error of a grounder hit by Rice allowed four runs to be scored.

Marshfield scored two in the fifth on a single by Chapman, a hard hit by Cox to Rice who stopped it but could not get Cox at first, and a single by Sutherland, and that finished the Pirates for the day.

Three singles, a double, a sacrifice and an error gave Coquille four more in the eighth, and then in the ninth Rice got his usual home run after Marlow had singled. Final score, 13-5.

The slugging of Coquille was the big feature of the day and it was especially pleasing to the Coquille rooters who formed nearly half of the 1200 or more in attendance.

Eugene slaughtered Myrtle Point Sunday and Bandon made a field day of its game with Cottage Grove to wind up their baseball for the season. Both teams are now out of the league.
