Two Little Girls Killed Sunday

Another of those needless accidents resulting in loss of life occurred on the road to the ferry at North Bend last Saturday night, when the two little girls of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Hansen of Marshfield, named Jensina and Betty Jean, were killed when their car was struck by one driven by Jack Wilson, of Reedsport. Their skulls were fractured by the uprights supporting the top. Both had their heads out when the collision occurred.

Mr. and Mrs. Hansen, with their seven children in the rear seat, were starting for an over Sunday trip north of the Bay, and in the dusk and dust the two drivers failed to give one another sufficient clearance.

The coroner's jury which investigated the case acquitted both drivers of criminal negligence.

The first one occurred Sunday when three girls from Powers, driving a Hudson sedan owned by Mr. Pyburn, of Powers, lost control of their car coming up the highway and ran into the ditch. The car turned on its side and slid for some 40 feet. As soon as the car stopped it burst into flames and the three girls escaped in time, all without injury. The car was almost completely consumed by the fire.

Collier, of Remote, was taken to Leep hospital by Dr. Gale Tuesday afternoon suffering from a broken leg as the result of an accident near the Metz place south of Bandon. Mr. and Mrs. Collier and four children were going south when Mr. Collier lost control of his car and ran into the ditch, turning over. The others were slightly injured.

Mr. Austin wasn't aware that he struck the other car.—Western World.
