Suffers Further Misfortune

"It was one of the saddest things I have seen in a long time," remarked a travelling man in the Sentinel office, referring to the fire which last Friday afternoon destroyed the ranch house and barn of Mrs. Blanche Yoakam at Remote, on the Roseburg highway. A little more than two weeks ago Mrs. Yoakam lost her husband and brother in that explosion on Sandy creek, when four men were killed, and this was followed Friday by the destruction of her house and barn which were partly covered by insurance.

At the same time the barn of Lawrence Jennings across the highway was destroyed.
