Auto Registration Increases

At the Coos County Chamber of Commerce meeting at Marshfield Monday night, President A. K. Peck stated that the foreign car registration at Marshfield had increased 129 per cent this year over the 1928 registration.

The meeting was attended by J. E. Norton, Lyman Carrier, and Harvey Hale, of this city. The latter two and Jos. Larson were appointed a committee to report on the application of Pamela Grange for membership in the county chamber.

The financial report of Treasurer J. E. Norton showed cash on hand and receipts since March 31, to be \$775.80, with \$259.20 expended, but payment for the recreational booklet has not been made and the treasury is in need of funds. Coquille has paid its membership quota but several of the other local chambers have not.

Loggers Lost a Poor Game

The official scorer at last Sunday's game between the Coquille Loggers and the Coos Bay Pirates at the Bay, gave Coquille credit for nine errors, a majority of them by the infield, but Bill Fortier says it should have been nearer 15. Time after time a bobble allowed the Pirates to tally one or more runs, and the wonder is that the score was as close as it was. Coos Bay won 13-9. Gilbert allowed eight hits in six innings and is charged with the defeat. "Penny" Sturdivant yielded three hits in three frames.

One of the bright spots of the game was the playing of the 16-year old youngster, Ray Woodyard, who handled three chances at second without an error. He played like a veteran and will be ready for regular duty in another year.

The same day Eugene had a tough time defeating a revamped Myrtle Point team, 3-2, thus retaining its position at the head of the column for no games lost during the second half.

New Power Unit at Bay

The announcement at the Bay that the Mt. States Power Co. will begin the construction of a new unit for the electrical plant at North Bend, is another indication of the development anticipated in southwestern Oregon.

Work will start Aug. 1 on the project which, when completed, will provide additional power of 10,000 kilowatts.

With the high power transmission line now building from Dixonville to Coos Bay, the increased power plant at the Bay will be called on to help supply the company's stations in the interior with juice, and in case of emergency the California and Oregon will furnish power for Coos county.

Mr. Alford says that an explosion, probably from gas dripping from the vacuum tank, started the blaze and it burned the car so quickly there was not even time to call the fire department.
