The first hit was a scratch single in the first inning by Fulford which might just as easily have been called an error, but the second through the diamond by Otto Davis was a clean hit. And that was all. The big fellow had his submarine ball working in fine shape and the visitors could do nothing with it. He fanned eight, and only passed one man.

The Loggers won the game in the first inning when four hits, one a triple by Fortier, scored three runs. They scored another in the third on hits by Marlow, Fortier and Rice, and finished scoring in the fifth with two runs, with three hits, a couple of errors and a sacrifice.

The whole team played the best ball it has shown this month, and they are now hopped up to win from Eugene out there next Sunday.

Single Regent Board Controls All of State Higher Education

Backed by a large majority of the state legislature, a favorable decision of the supreme court, and evident support from the public, Oregon's new plan for the administration of state supported higher education went into effect July 1 under the leadership of the board of education consisting of nine men appointed by Governor I. L. Patterson. This board, with the assistance of a full-time executive secretary, now has full charge of the affairs of Oregon State college at Corvallis, the University of Oregon at Eugene, the Oregon Normal School at Corvallis, the Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland, and the Eastern Oregon Normal at LaGrande.

The board has been empowered to conduct an impartial survey of all the institutions to determine their needs and most effective organization, after which it may allocate the total funds appropriated for higher education as it sees fit. For the first year there is to be no change in the present ratio of distribution.
