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Vegetable and Animal

Life in Death Valley

Death valley, in California, long reputed to be one of the most lifeless areas on the face of the earth, is not so barren as popularly believed. A group of scientists recently returned from having made the first comprehensive survey of the plant and animal life inhabiting the floor of Death valley. And their report upsets much tradition long firmly rooted in the public mind.

A summary of Death valley's plant and animal resources now scientifically and officially recorded includes 135 different species of plants, trees and

shrubs; 124 different kinds of birds; 12 reptiles, 1 fish, 235 varieties of insects, and numerous mammals.

The sole representative of the fish group recorded upon the floor of North America's greatest sub-sea level depression is a small minnow scientifically designated as Cyprinodon Maculatus. This creature inhabits the salt marshes and salt water springs of Death valley. The mammals represented range in size from the bighorn mountain sheep (Ovis Nelsoni), which come down upon the floor of the valley from their natural habitat in the neighboring Panamint and Funeral mountains; on down to coyotes, rabbits, moles, mice and shrews.

Narrowing Gulf

The gulf of California, the narrow arm of the sea just south of our southwestern border, seems to be gradually disappearing from the map. Recent surveys show that the peninsula of Lower California is widening and that the gulf is growing more shallow each year.

The phenomenon was first noted more than 200 years ago by the Jesuit priests who were the earliest colonizers of the peninsula. About thirty years ago a scientifically inclined inhabitant planted a number of palm trees about ten feet from the shore of the sea. His trees are now more than one hundred yards inland. Twenty years ago there was considerable crossing the gulf, but now navigation with large boats is somewhat dangerous.

It's a Real Gold Strike

Reports of the richness and the magnitude of ore ledges which have been discovered in the Mule Creek area are not myths. They give promise of exceeding the fondest dreams of the most imaginative of the prospectors now in that area, says the Curry County Reporter.

This is the news brought into Gold Beach on Tuesday by Irvin and Evered Billings who had just come down from the new fields to make filings on claims they have staked during the past two weeks.

In fact the two men who have lived many years in the Mule Creek country and know every foot of the ground, declare that the new diggings give promise of becoming one of the greatest, if not the greatest mining centers ever developed in Oregon.

Ore carrying high values in gold and silver is found in and along a great dike from 600 to 1500 feet wide and extending for many miles north and south of the Rogue River. In fact, Evered Billings declares that he has personally traced the dike for 19 miles and along the entire stretch there are splendid indications of values.

Ore ledges ranging from a few inches to several feet in thickness and nearly parallel to each other are found in the dike wherever it has been opened and the two young men say there are none of these ledges which do not yield good values.

In some of the ledges where free gold is found the values range into the thousands and the average of all the ore in the ledges is of good milling quality.

Dynamite Explosion Injures One

McCulloch, of Powers, was badly burned over his entire body last Friday when the engine of the Coos Bay Lumber Co. logger ran over a box of dynamite which had fallen off a carload of stuff being taken to the Eden Ridge camp. J. L. Turbin, the other man in the engine cab was but slightly hurt. The rear of the engine was wrecked.

Great Artist's Pipes

Prized as Art Relics

One does not often hear of smoker's pipes being ranked high among art relics. The date of the introduction of tobacco precludes them from boasting of remote antiquity of origin, though your smoker who makes the coloring of a pipe a solemn ritual may have very pronounced views on its artistic claims. Nor is his point of view ignored by the fine arts authorities, for, adjacent to a rich collection of snuff-boxes, there may be seen at the museum of decorative arts, in the Louvre, a number of well-seasoned pipes, most of which must have belonged to hearty smokers. Perhaps the most noteworthy are a couple of briars which belonged to the painter Corot. It is said that he smoked these pipes while painting several of his greatest works, and if so, they have a legitimate claim to distinction. Pipes attributed to illustrious men are not uncommonly met with elsewhere in Paris, usually in cafes which were frequented by the great, but they are sometimes of doubtful authenticity. Verelaine, for instance, would appear to have left a pipe in almost every cafe he frequented, and these were many.—From the Continental Edition of the London Daily Mail.

in Scorpion Hunting

One of the most peculiar hunting expeditions on record is that which takes place at more or less regular intervals in the town of Maridine, in Asia Minor. The town is surrounded by ancient walls built to protect it from invaders, and hidden in various places in these walls are hordes of scorpions which often become a menace to the population. In order to keep down the number of these pests, said to be death-dealing, a bonus is offered by the municipality and regular hunts are organized. The hunts take place at night when the hunters, armed with lanterns, poke around the walls and dislodge the scorpions. The next day they carry them to the town officials and collect the money due them as a reward. It frequently happens that they must wait upon the pleasure of that official, when they while away the time by making their ferocious captives engage in combat. Bets are made on the results, and it often happens that members of the waiting party have lost their money before they receive it.
