Letter From Alaskan Travelers

Following is a letter sent to Mrs. W. C. Chase by the five Coos county young people who are making the two-weeks' trip to Alaska on the cruise sponsored by the university. It was written Aug. 8:

Hello, everybody, we are now somewhere between Victoria B. C. and Ketchikan, we are having wonderful weather and no one has been seasick that we know of.

Our mascot, a small black cub bear, hasn't been feeling quite up to par and has been crying and quailing a good deal, but all others have been very discreet in covering up any feelings if they have had any.

Yesterday we left Seattle at 10 o'clock after seeing the city in a rubber neck bus and arrived in Victoria, B. C., at three o'clock where we took another sight-seeing tour, visiting all of the harbors, residential districts, business houses, castles, and governmental buildings. We last visited the museum in the Parliament building, which we enjoyed very much. The stuffed wild animals, birds, snakes and such were not as interesting as the collection of early Alaskan relics. We saw coffins carved to represent fish, birds, and animals, lots of baskets woven by the early Alaskan Indian, diminutive totem poles carved out of slate and polished with oil.

The eating dishes were the size of small cradles or babies' bathtubs and were carved to represent boats or animals. We saw the early fishing implements and musical instruments.

One case showed skulls of important Alaskan Indians, calling attention to the flatness of the skulls on top; in the next case a cradle with a baby papoose was displayed, showing how pressure was used on the baby's head and feet to give the head the flat effect found in the skull case.

We were quite disappointed in not getting to sample some of Canada's Wet having found Canadian Dry quite the usual Ginger Ale.

On returning to the boat we found he S. S. Empress of Asia docked on the pier next to ours, and Helen Whitaker and her mother on board ready to return to the Orient. We were quite happy to meet again and sailed away shouting bon voyage and waving goodbye.

Their ship made us feel rather small and we wished we were going to make the trip that they will take. Helen told us that they will be in Yokama in ten days. In ten days we will be in our way home from Alaska.

Tomorrow at four o'clock we arrive at Ketchikan and it will be our first stop on Alaskan territory. We will write and tell you all about it.

Offers 200 Acre Airport Site

Through its president, L. J. Simpson, the Empire Development Co. has offered a free site of 200 acres to be used as an airport on Coos Bay. The land is valued at \$500 an acre by the company and is located at Bar View, a short distance north of Charleston.

If the land is sufficiently level there to permit of it being graded, Coos Bay has an opportunity to secure a landing field at a great saving.

But the Coos Bay committee, which is working on the proposition to secure an airport, has not yet accepted the offer but has taken the same attitude that the Coquille Lions Club has, by asking that experts from the Department of Commerce, or the Army or Navy be sent to make a selection from all available sites.

In the Coquille valley the Arago location is still being considered and hope has not been abandoned that it can be used for a county airport.

But wherever a landing field site is selected the whole county should get behind the proposal and help put it over for the time has come that a community without an airport is more isolated than it formerly was without a railroad.
