NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT for the Improvement of Beach Street and Knowlton Avenue

Notice is hereby given that on the 19th day of August, 1929, the Common Council of the City of Coquille duly passed an Ordinance, No. 531, entitled:

"An Ordinance levying and declaring an assessment against the lots, part of lots and parcels of land benefited by the improvement of Beach Street from the South line of First Street to the Knowlton Bridge; Beach Street from the South end of Knowlton Bridge to the North line of Knowlton Avenue; Knowlton Avenue from a point 30 feet west from intersection with west line of Beach Street thence East 275 feet to present graded roadway, all in the corporate limits of the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, according to the apportionment of benefits adopted and filed on the 30th day of July, 1929, by the City Recorder and the Committee on Streets and directing the City Recorder to enter a statement thereof in the docket of City Liens and declaring an emergency," and by said ordinance an assessment was duly levied and imposed for the whole cost of the improvement of Beach Street from the South line of First Street to the Knowlton Bridge; Beach Street from the South end of Knowlton Bridge to the North line of Knowlton Avenue; Knowlton Avenue from a point 30 feet west from intersection with west line of Beach Street thence East 275 feet to present graded roadway, and that the whole amount of said assessment is the sum of \$5,035.60 and that the lots and parts of lots and parcels of land assessed for said improvement are included within the following boundaries, to-wit:

Commencing at the Southeast Corner of Lot 2, Block A, Knowlton Heights Addition; thence North 173.00 feet to the Northeast Corner of said Lot 2; thence South 89 deg. 04 min. West along northerly line of said Knowlton Heights Addition, a distance of 374.90 feet; thence South

along westerly line of Beach Street 67.20 feet; thence South 37 deg. 35 min. West 125.7 feet; thence East along North line of Knowlton Avenue a distance of 64.5 feet; thence South, crossing Knowlton Avenue and following along the West line of Lot 7, Block C of said Knowlton Heights Addition a distance of 255.0 feet to south boundary of City limits; thence East along said South boundary of city limits, a distance of 129.0 feet to southeast corner of Lot 6, Block C of said Knowlton Heights Addition; thence North 86 deg. 15 min. East along the south line of said Knowlton Heights Addition, a distance of 258.56 feet to the Southeast corner of Lot 2, Block C, said Knowlton Heights Addition; thence North along the East line of said Lot 2, Block C and crossing Knowlton Avenue, a distance of 258.28 feet to the place of beginning.

Also commencing at the Southeast Corner of Lot 4, Block 59 of Elliott's Addition to the City of Coquille; thence North 200.0 feet to the Northeast corner of Lot 1, Block 59 of said Elliott's Addition; thence West along South line of First Street, 280.0 feet to the Northwest corner of Lot 12, Block 45 of said Elliott's Addition; thence South 200.00 feet to the South-west corner of Lot 9, Block 45 of said Elliott's Addition, thence East 280.0 feet to place of beginning.

That said assessment is on file in the office of the City Recorder, reference to which is hereby made, the same as if fully written herein.

Notice is further given that said assessment is now due and payable and will bear interest at the legal rate from the 19th day of August, 1929, and will become delinquent within 30 days from the date of the first publication of this notice.

THEREFORE, all persons interested in said assessment are hereby notified either to pay said assessment within 30 days from the date of this notice or to file their application in writing to pay the same in installments as required by Section 33 of the Charter of said City within 30 days from the date of this notice. All persons whose property has been assessed for said improvement to the

amount of \$25.00 or more may file their application to pay said assessment in installments, which installments will require a payment of the annual interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, together with 10 per cent of the principal, annually, for a period of 10 years.

Date of first publication of this notice is the 23rd day of August, 1929, and all such assessments must be paid or bonded on or before the 23rd day of September, 1929.
