Two Fires Saturday Morning

Scores of 3-inch Fish Taken

Seven men were fined \$25 each in Justice Stanley's court here Monday for violations of the fish laws on the South Fork and its tributaries last Sunday. The arrests were made by Deputy Game Warden C. A. Hearing who returned Saturday from a month's stay in western Lane, Linn and Douglas counties, where he apprehended a lot of game laws violators. Two of them were men who had been spotlighting for deer and who killed the goat they had brought along to supply milk for a baby of the party. They mistook it for a deer.

Joe Mulligan, M. E. Watrons and Gordon Watrons were taken by the game warden for snagging salmon. This is done by attaching pieces of lead to a line with several hooks in between. Two of the party locate the salmon and heave rocks into the pool, driving the fish to the spot where the hooks are sunk. The third man then jerks the line and the salmon are snagged by the hooks in body, tail head or wherever they touch.

The law on this point says, "No fish shall be taken or killed except by angling for same in the ordinary manner with a rod and line or line held in the hand and the hook or hooks baited with natural or artificial bait or lure. Fishing with snag or gaff hooks, set line, or line having more than three hooks thereon shall be deemed unlawful."

Hardy Lagenburg and R. B. Morgan were arrested for catching fish under the legal limit in violation of the law which says, "It shall be unlawful within the state of Oregon to angle for or catch or have in possession any game fish, except sunfish and crappies, under six inches in length at any time."

Both men had more than the legal limit of fish under six inches, some of them not more than three inches in length.

V. and L. Huntley were fined for fishing without having an angler's license.

Mr. Hearing took pictures of the fish and equipment captured, Monday morning, and then turned the trout over to Fred C. McNelly for the use of the inmates at the county farm.

their schedules. Parents are invited to accompany students to register.

A new subject is to be offered in the Commercial Course, Junior Business Training to be offered to Freshmen. This course will be a prerequisite to all other Commercial subjects, and will be required of all incoming Commercial Freshmen. The course is not required of Sophomores, Juniors or Seniors, but is recommended for Sophomores, unless they expect to take advanced Bookkeeping. Bookkeeping will thus become a Sophomore and Junior subject, rather than a Freshman and Sophomore subject, while Typing will revert back to a Junior and Senior subject, as it was previous to last year.

There are two reasons for the above change. First, the average Freshman coming into High School has been found to be too immature in age and knowledge of business dealings to properly master Bookkeeping during his Freshman year. The result has been that a large number have failed every year in the work. The second reason is that last year when typing was opened to the underclass students, the equipment of typewriters, tables, books, phonograph, and records, were very badly abused, Freshmen and Sophomores displaying their inability to properly handle expensive and delicate property belonging to the district. This year only upper classmen will be allowed in the typing room at any time, except for those few sophomores who showed exceptional ability last year in typing and who will be allowed to continue with advanced typing this year.

Chemistry is to be offered to Juniors and Seniors. This is the first time this course has been offered to local high school students for several years and it is hoped that enough will register to justify offering it again and making it a part of the yearly schedule. The course will be taught by H. H. Hartley, Science teacher and Coach. A large supply of chemicals and apparatus, which will completely equip the high school laboratory, has been received.

The College Preparatory, Smith-Hughes, General and Home Economics courses will be practically the same as in years past.

Council Session Monday Night

Requests for repair and alteration of buildings within the fire limits occupied considerable of the council's attention Monday evening.

The request of Ned C. Kelley to put in a partition of wall board and build a balcony over the rear of the room in the W. O. W. building, which he is going to occupy for his insurance agency was granted.

Permission was given J. D. Bergan to construct a temporary building on the east of the W. O. W. building providing he used tile for the walls and he agreed to the changes made in his request for the permit.

Mrs. Emily Hersey's request for permission to extend to the sidewalk the building occupied by J. A. Thomas' Coquille Shoe Shop was laid over till the next meeting. She desired to make the extension of lumber and to paint the building, but the council refused to grant the permit unless she would use fireproof material in the new work.

Her application to move the stairway, along side the building occupied by Nosler & Walker, so that it would be perpendicular to the building, and at the rear of the Coquille Shoe Shop, was favorably acted upon.

The offer of C. A. Pendleton to deed a 10-foot strip, 300 feet long, for an alley, between Ninth and Tenth streets, at the east end of Ninth, was referred to the street committee to investigate. The committee was given power to accept the tract for the city if deemed advisable.

Herman Hickam's petition for the vacation of 20 feet on the west side of Moulton street, between Fourth and Fifth, was granted. The land is all low ground and of no earthly use as a street, but the vacation permits Mr. Hickam to build a house with platform connection with the higher portion of Moulton street.

The engineer's report on the completion of the North end sewer was accepted and \$1,353.38 was ordered paid the contractors, Anderson & Matson.

Mr. Stacer also said that the blocks now ready for pavement in the north end would have to be closed to traffic at once.

The assessment for the Beach street and Knowlton avenue improvement was adopted by the council and the property owners must either bond or pay for the improvement at once.

An ordinance was adopted instructing the marshal to have the sidewalk on Front street, in front of the lot owned by W. S. Graham, which is a part of the Coast Auto Lines Garage, repaired and put in first class condition, the cost to be assessed against the property.

Water Superintendent Epperson, City Engineer Stacer and City Attorney Corby were authorized to proceed this week to secure rights of way for the new water line between the dam and the reservoir. The city does not desire to buy the land crossed, but simply to secure an easement which would allow the laying of the line and permission of its employees to traverse the line when necessary.
