Letter From Boy Scout Camp
The following letter was received last week from Frederick Fuhrman by Harlan Buckingham. Frederick and John Unsold returned last week from the Boy Scout summer camp, but the letter gives an idea of their activities while they were away:

Devils Garden, Cascade Mts.
We are all having a fine time. We came over Willamette Pass and will return by McKenzie Pass. We left Roseburg at 5:40 Tuesday, August 6, and camped that night at Immigrant creek, near Diamond Peak, elevation 8750 ft. The next day we climbed Diamond Peak and returned in seven hours. According to the record we were the fourth party up there in three years. That night we arrived here at 8:30. Thursday we rested and Friday we climbed The Bachelor (elevation 9045), before breakfast. Saturday we rested and Sunday we left camp at 1:00 a. m. and arrived at top of South Sister (elevation 10,352 ft.) at 7:00 a. m. We saw the sunrise and through the smoke it looked fiery red. On top we met a party of 20 Skyliners club of Bend but we beat them up by over two hours. At 12:30 p. m. a party of 38 members of the Obelidian club of Eugene, bringing the total on top to nearly 80. We expected a party of Mazamas up but found that they will not come until Tuesday. We will rest for a few days and then move over the mountain to Fog Camp on McKenzie highway. There is fine fishing here and some campers have been supplying us with fish, so we have had plenty to eat.

Two Claimed Ownership of Still
James Fisher, employed by A. L. Reynolds on the Shaw ranch, six miles below Bandon, pleaded guilty to possession of mash in Justice Young's court this week and was fined \$200.

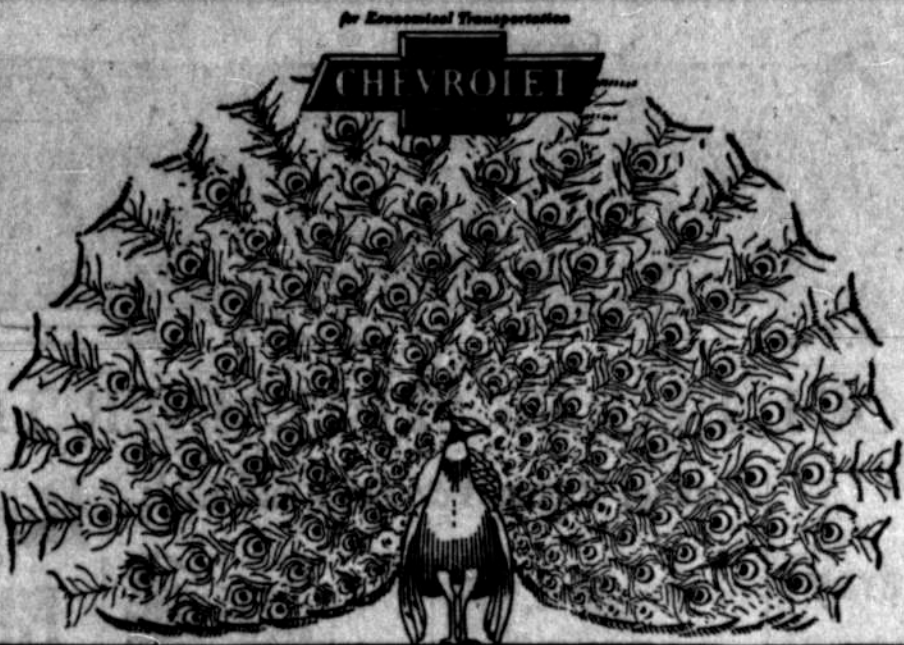
