Smith-Hughes Course Popular

The Smith-Hughes course in Agriculture offered in the high school is a popular one. Enrollment figures show that approximately one out of every three boys enrolled in high school are taking this work.

While this course teaches the basic principles of good farming, according to W. M. Canning, the instructor, it does not necessarily mean that only those boys who are going to continue in farm work will be benefited. The course will include markets and marketing. Those who are looking forward to a business career will be greatly benefited by an intelligent understanding of agricultural problems and the scientific principles back of good farm practices. The general condition of agriculture is a good index to the commercial prosperity of the nation. Any boy, regardless of the career chosen, will be better able to understand economic conditions if he has as a background an understanding of the problems that affect agriculture.

The project work carried on in connection with the course gives the boy profitable employment and at the same time teaches him accurate business methods in handling his own financial affairs.

Among the summaries of the project handed in at the beginning of school was one in which a boy stated that he started with 50 pullets and 6 capons last year. He had an investment of approximately \$100.00, but had already taken in over \$250.00, intending to increase his income this year. This is only an example of the profit and business training which can be expected from this course.
