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Presence of Edith Cavell Is Felt by Screen Players

There is something more than acting to "Dawn," the life of Edith Cavell, which is to be shown at the Liberty Theatre, on Sunday and Monday. Unlike other motion picture productions this film is not a work of imagination created solely to entertain. It is a memorial to a great woman and a stirring event in the history of the world.

"Dawn" was produced in an entirely different manner from other cinema entertainments. In the first place it adheres strictly to fact. The story was written by one, who knew Nurse Cavell and was able to draw a pen picture of her life and heroic deeds without color or exaggeration. The biography from which the picture was made is the work of Capt. Reginald Berkeley. It is a pulsating record of courageous deeds, human emotions and lofty ideals.

The picture was directed by Herbert Wilcox, one of England's greatest photoplay producers. He has been dubbed "the film-poet," by the immortal George Bernard Shaw.

Sybil Thorndike, who portrays Nurse Cavell, was a close friend of the war nurse, Miss Thorndike, in addition to being one of the greatest emotional actresses of our day, knew Edith Cavell as perhaps no other person knew her. In delineating the role Miss Thorndike ceased to act, or to put in her own words, "I became Nurse Cavell. I could feel her spirit hovering over me. Into my ear she seemed to whisper, 'I would do this in this manner,' or 'I would never do that.' At times the feeling was uncanny. Perhaps it was because we were acting in the exact locale where those tragic events occurred, a spot

that has been hallowed; but whatever the cause I ceased to act and actually lived the life of Edith Cavell. It is an experience I shall never forget."

The role of Madam Bodart was assumed by herself. This brave woman, who lived through those stirring days of the war, existed again in memory as she repeated the scenes before the camera. At times the brave soul almost broke down. She, too, felt the invisible presence of Nurse Cavell. She, too, heard her whispered directions as the drama progressed.

Even among the extras there were hundreds who had known the British Joan of Arc. Some of them were once more repeating the scenes through which they lived. They, too, imagined that they saw the nurse moving among them, speaking words of comfort and hope. It was no artificial play. The events depicted had sunk too deeply in their memories to be treated lightly. It was realism—realism of a kind that is seldom found in the theatre or upon the screen. The acting was spontaneous, a sub-conscious repetition of the events that had shook the world scarcely a decade before.

Even the finished picture when flashed upon the screen produces the effect that Nurse Cavell is overshadowing it, giving her blessing and benediction to a work that will long be remembered.

been asked to be present and install these new officers.

Coos county now has eleven granges and the Pomona has completed its second year with remarkable growth in membership. Reports of officers from subordinate granges showed that Coos River Grange has the only orchestra and the North Bayside Grange has the only hall. The other granges meet in rented halls.

There are 166 members in Pomona Grange has 125 members. All standing committees are active and the Myrtle Grange has about \$50,000.00 in grange fire relief insurance. Catching Inlet which was reported by the master, Geo. Ross, has 69 members and is in good financial standing. Henry Gustafson, master of North Bayside Grange, who Monday evening returned from a visit in Sweden, received an ovation when he entered the hall. The other granges made no report but County Deputy Arthur Brown states that all granges were in good financial conditions.

A resolution urged that logged off timber land be classified and segregated in agriculture and grazing land and instructed the Pomona master to appoint a committee of three to work with Coos County Chamber of Commerce to draft a memorial to congressman W. C. Hawley urging that the necessary legislation be enacted, was adopted. The committee composed of County Agent Harvey S. Hale, Fred Moser and Henry Gustafson was so appointed.

The resolution requesting that tide-gates be placed at Beaver Slough, Haynes Slough, Larson Slough and Stock Slough so that land drained by these sloughs may be reclaimed, was referred to the same committee. Just before lunch Henry Gustafson gave an interesting talk on Sweden.

trying to hold the city up and he thought a session of the property owners with a committee from the council would probably result in an amicable settlement. The water committee was thereupon named to meet with them last evening.

A call for bids for \$2,588.10 of Beach street and Knowlton Ave. improvements bonds was ordered.

The city engineer reported the completion of the north end paving improvement. The contractors, Anderson & Matson, have been paid \$6705.65, leaving a balance due them of \$20,767.06, which was ordered paid.

As the first step toward metering every water consumer in Coquille, the water superintendent was instructed to install meters at the three butcher shops, the court house and the Standard Oil Co. plant.

The matter of placing stop signs at the intersection of the Fairview road and the paving on Tenth street was left to the street commission. With the traffic there is to Camp 3 it is necessary that the signs be placed on one street or the other, and on account of the rough gravelled Fairview road that would appear to be the logical street for the sign.

The street commissioner was also instructed to look after the decking in the Knowlton Heights bridge, which is loose, and to secure the county grader and scrape the gravelled streets which were improved last year. Fifth and Sixth, Hall and Elliott, east of the highway, are likely to go to pieces this winter unless the city spends some money in keeping them in condition.

The city engineer was instructed to make the necessary changes for diverting the water from the lot of Mrs. W. S. Sickels on Henry street. The water from the street and gutter runs on to her property and makes a mudhole where she expects to build a house soon.

The plumber's bond of Geo. Melville, who comes from Reedsport, was approved by the council.
