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Would Provide Grazing Land

The following from the Bandon World goes into more detail regarding the efforts of Pomona Grange and the Coos County Chamber of Commerce are making to have logged-off government land opened to entry:

In view of making the logged-off lands of the O. & C. grant lands in this section available for grazing, a joint effort is being made by the Coos County Chamber of Commerce and the Pomona Grange to interest the federal government in a change of policy affecting these lands.

At the present time the timber is being sold by the government, giving ten years time in which to remove it. The buyers are in nearly all cases removing the cedar and leaving the fir, or removing all but a small part of the tract in order to hold it. In the meantime the logged-off sections grow up to brush and are left practically useless.

Harvey S. Hale, county agricultural agent, reported at the meeting of the county chamber, held at Coquille Monday evening, that the Pomona Grange has named a committee to work with the county chamber. They want the government to open up the logged off sections in sufficiently large tracts to make them available as sheep or cattle range. The lands as soon as logged should be burned and seeded, thus making them useful grazing lands.

Mr. Hale states that Oregon has 87,000 acres of this land that is either logged off already or to be logged off. If properly handled by the government it could be made to add materially to the agricultural wealth of the state.

Sheep do especially well on this land. In Coos county four years ago the sheep population was 5,000, according to Mr. Hale. This year it is 25,000. At an average value of \$10 this means a quarter of a million dollars worth of sheep.
