We must have both evergreens and deciduous shrubs to have the proper effect around one's home.

"The evergreens are beautiful, 'tis true, But let us bring some nude ones, too. So prune and plant to your heart's content. For spring will come and we'll ne'er repent; Our gardens so fair, all abloom will be A joy for our friends and neighbors to see."

Some expressions of Mr. Romaine B. Ware about trees for foliage are certainly worth taking note of: "Hawthorns really seem to be the most valuable trees and shrubs to him."

The tree hydrangeas also plays a big part as it's a large shrub making a grand display when it blooms, on account of its lasting flowers. Among the large-sized flowering shrubs there are the sumas, Tartian honeysuckle and the snowball, which are very good because in the fall they are either in brilliant foliage or berries.

The mock orange such as the Virginialis, are especially good and are not used as much as they should be. The Tamarix has a dainty feathery foliage and is most attractive as the wind waves it to and fro. Branches are good for cutting.

The rhododendron and azalea are both very splendid as shrubs. As to soil preparation for these two, it will be taken up at another date.
