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Seeking to Aid the Blind

A comprehensive survey of the blind of Oregon, which is expected to result in a great deal of information that will aid in vocational work, is to be conducted by the department of sociology of the University of Oregon, in co-operation with the Lions clubs of the state. It is announced by Dr. P. A. Parson, Assistant Dr. Parson, will be Edward C. Robbins, graduate of the University of Oregon who is now a candidate for a degree of master of arts. Robbins has made a remarkable record as a blind student and will assist in the survey as an expert consultant.

New state and federal legislation which will be of help in assisting blind people to be economically independent will be sought on the basis of the survey, it is stated.

Blind persons in various parts of the state are being asked to help in obtaining the names and addresses of every sightless person that they know of. It is estimated that there are from six to eight hundred blind people in the state of Oregon. The whole purpose of the survey will be to find out exactly what can be done to help these sightless people.

Elks Play Nov. 13

"Twelve Thousand," a German playwright's creation dealing with a German culture and laid entirely in a German setting—but stirringly American in its implications—is the first offering that the First Circuit Repertory company brings to Marshfield with its new season, under the auspices of the Elks.

"Twelve Thousand" will be presented at the Egyptian theatre on Wednesday, November 13, and is the first of three plays which have been selected for the seventh season of this company. The two plays to follow are "The Makropoulos Secret," by Karel Capek, and "White Wings" by Philip Barry.

The first play of the First Circuit Repertory company for its season of 1939-40, tells the story of England under its German George III seeking to buy recruits among the princelings of Germany to be put into uniforms and shipped across the seas to fight England's unpopular war against the revolting American colonies.

In the swift, simple, direct and keenly human interplay of human emotions in the summer pavilion of the German ducal palace, one is enabled to catch a new, and, to most of us, unfamiliar glimpse of the England of that time, the Germany of that time, and the sudden and startling vigor with which the seed of revolution scattered by the American colonists shot down its strong roots in the very soil where the entrenched doctrine of divine right of kings would seem to make such a thing impossible.

Moroni Olsen will be cast as Piderit, the confidential secretary to the prince, who risks his head—and wins—to save his twelve thousand peasant brethren from being herded across the Atlantic for cannon fodder.

Franklin Rasmussen, who played with the company during its first two years, returns in the role of Faucett, envoy from George III, buying Hessian peasants, and Sumner Chase Cobb is cast as the prince's minister.
