

Dental Survey in Coquille

The local dentists in Coquille and the Health Department co-operated in a dental survey in Coquille, October, 1929.

Of the 508 grade school pupils examined, 173 were found to be either corrected or had naturally good teeth, of which the latter was in a very small quantity.

The majority, 335, were found to be in need of a dentist and many were losing some of their teeth which will never be replaced by natural molars.

Prizes have been offered, of which one is the silver loving cup the local Chamber of Commerce gave last year to the school with the highest percentage of good teeth. This year the local B. P. W. club offered a silver loving cup to the room with the highest percentage of good teeth.

In comparison with last year's survey of the 499 school children exam-

ined, 153 were found with good teeth. At the end of the contest this number went over 250.

The most important factor with these surveys is to teach the children the need of having their teeth examined by a dentist twice a year; if they can be convinced of this, the children will have in the future a trained habit of keeping their teeth in the best condition and that is, after all, the biggest prize and one in which the individual will be benefitted.

The contest will be closed in January, 1930.

B. & P. W. Secretary Coming

"One of the most noted signs of changing times is the change in attitude towards the woman who works, says Miss Ruth Rich, field secretary of the National Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs, who is to speak in Coquille November 15.

"In my visits to the Business & Professional Women's Clubs throughout the country I have recently had occasion to inquire of the women what their girls are going to do after they get out of school. In almost every instance the mother has named some avenue of business or some profession which her daughter is planning to take up.

"I was born in the South, where the attitude towards women in business has been far more conservative than that of the North, and I can easily remember the day when almost the only profession a woman could enter without being severely criticised, was teaching or stenography. In contrast with that situation it is very interesting today to note that mothers, even Southern mothers, have a tremendous pride in the fact that their daughters do work and are enormously pleased at the range of professions they are following."

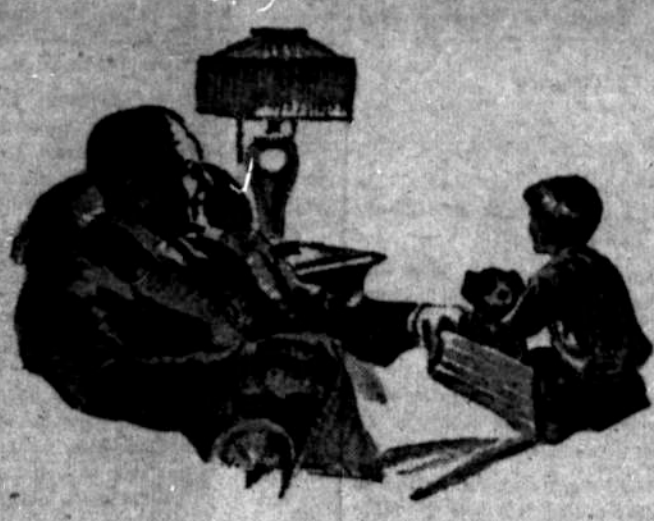

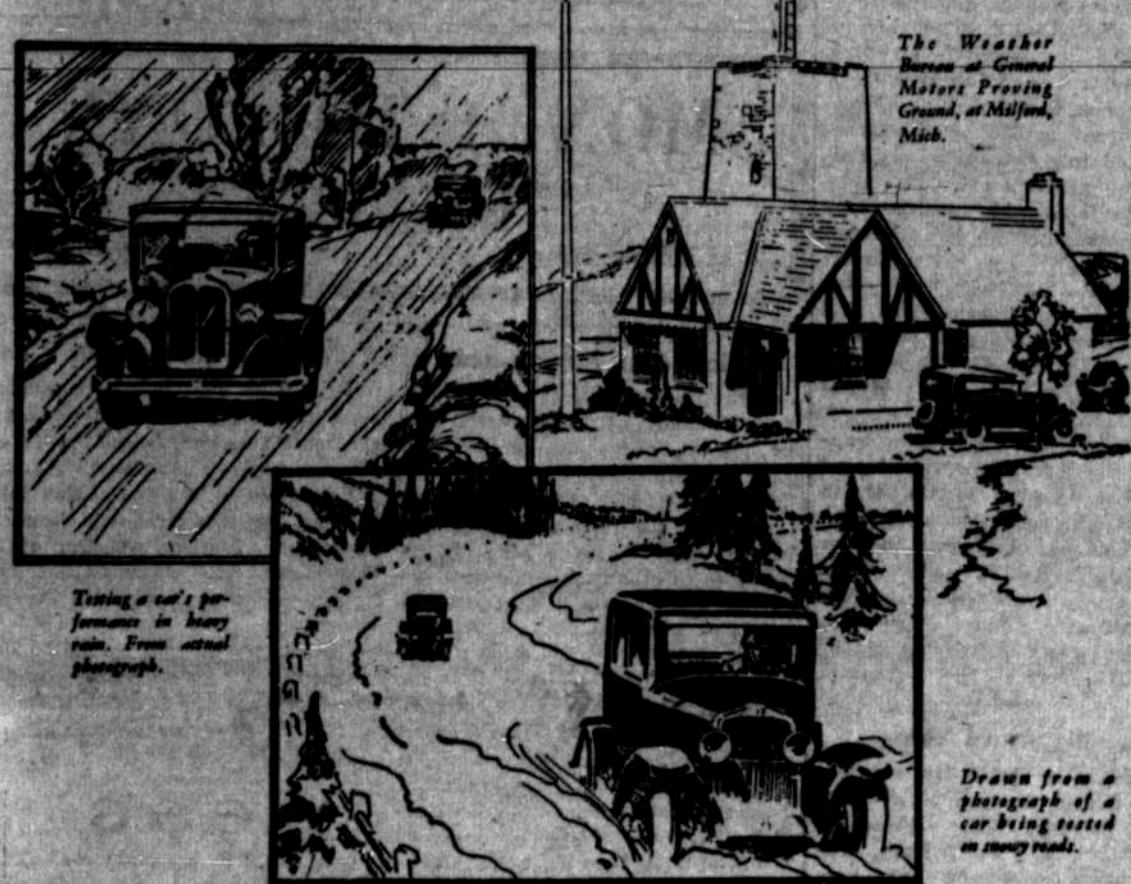
