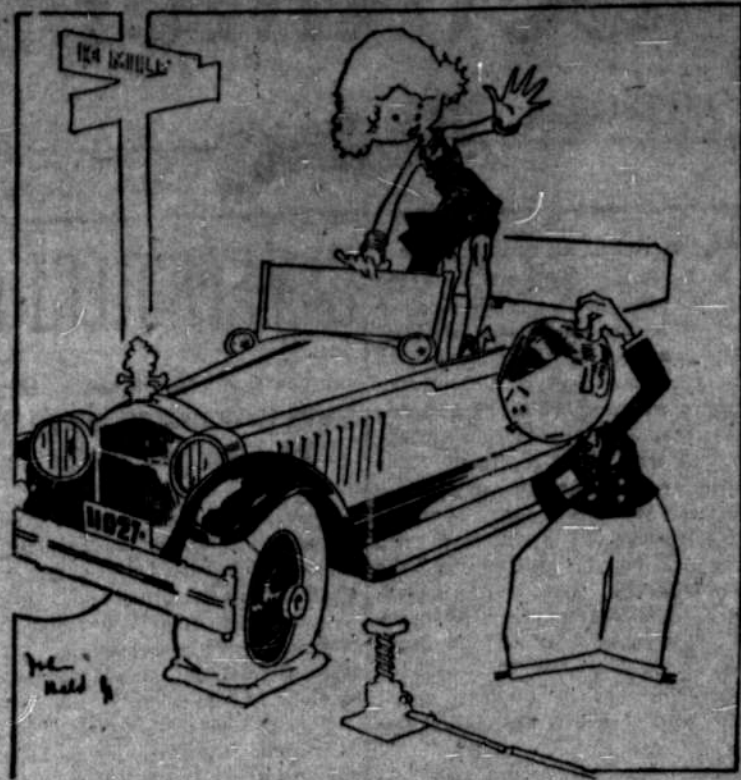

Miss Ruth Rich, B. & P. W.
Field Secretary, Speaks Here

Miss Ruth Rich, field secretary of the national federation of Business and Professional Women, met with the Coquille Club Friday evening, Nov. 15. Several delegates from the Coos Bay Club joined us in welcoming Miss Rich.

The program opened with two songs, "Friend O' Mine" and "Rose of My Heart," sung by Mrs. H. Covatt, accompanied by Miss Edythe Farr. Following these came the presentation, by Mrs. Bryant, of visiting members to our club and the introduction of Miss Rich by Miss Bernice Mirra-soul, chairman of this district.

Miss Rich spoke of many topics of interest to B. P. W.'s such as increase in numbers, aims of federation, local problems arising in clubs, etc.

She called to our attention the growth in clubs and membership, the federation now having 1018 clubs with a total membership of 53,207, an increase of 139 clubs and 3189 members over that of 1928. Another point of interest was the aims of B. P. W. as a whole, i. e., to increase the interest of members in our organization; to raise standards of education in accordance with our slogan, "At least a high school education for every girl;" to arouse a keener civic conscience in B. P. W. clubs and to secure greater participation in international B. P. W. work.

In direct line with point two above is the creation and administration of scholarship loan funds throughout the nation. A questionnaire sent out but not yet completely answered and analyzed, gives 400 clubs having such funds, the amount disbursed about \$156,425, and the number assisted 17,000.

In speaking of international work she mentioned the excellent example of foreign clubs in the solution of local civic problems and the new ideas advanced and promoted by them. She also called attention to the unique privilege of the Vancouver, B. C. club in having in its membership women from England, Scotland, Ireland and eastern Canada, as well as one member who had been a business woman in France for a number of years and hence could speak with authority on French business conditions.

A very interesting feature of her talk was a reference to recent destructive criticism of business and professional women by writers for current magazines and papers. Miss Rich said that the value of such criticism both as news value and as giving us a different viewpoint of ourselves and our field of work is undoubted, but we should consider to what extent the critic had informed herself or himself, how authentic were the statements, and whether such critic was altogether fair in charges and demands considering the length of time women have been in the business field.

The speaker closed with a plea that members attend all state, regional and national conventions when it was possible to do so, since it is only by associating ourselves with large views that we can gain breadth of vision; that only by such breadth of vision and acquaintance with and inspiration from the leaders in legislative and social advance can we hope to do our share in placing women on the plane of equal recognition and opportunity with their brother workers in life's field.

Caravan to San Diego, Jan. 20

The date for the Roosevelt Coast-Highway caravan, from Coos and Curry counties to San Diego, Calif., has been set, according to the secretary, O. B. Robertson, for Monday, January 20, with the tentative schedule for leaving Gold Beach fixed at 10:30 a. m. The itinerary calls for a six days' trip south, arriving at San Diego on Sunday afternoon. The caravan will disband there.

The night stops are tentatively set as follows:

Jan. 20, Crescent City; Jan. 21, Eureka; Jan. 22, San Francisco; Jan. 23, San Luis Obispo; Jan. 24, Los Angeles; Jan. 25, San Diego.

Mr. Robertson adds to the itinerary announcement:

"We earnestly urge every member of our Association and all citizens to commence immediately the arrangement of his plans with a view of participation.

"We have the scenery and the climate, and a highway over which winter touring is fully as attractive as summer. We want you to join us in making this fact known, and this caravan offers a splendid opportunity."

Financial Report County Fair

Henry E. Hess, Coquille representative on the Coos & Curry Fair board, reported to the chamber meeting Wednesday evening the following financial statement for this year's fair, which shows a mortgage reduction of \$2350, which also included interest payments:

Expenses—Labor \$750.20; Premiums \$1283.35; Insurance, Supplies, Decorations, Hay, Straw, etc., \$1213.70; Mortgage & Notes, \$2350.00; Interest, \$596.81; Taxes, \$264.43; Advertising, \$150.07; Races, \$2,022.50; Music, \$1,031.00. Total, \$9661.06.

Receipts—Received from State Tax \$1330.22; Rent of Ground, Shows, etc. \$841.00; Received from County, \$500.00; Concession, Shows, etc. \$1560.50; Gate Money, \$1940.00; Grand Stand, \$645.00; Dance Hall, \$1280.00; Borrowed from Bank, \$300.00; Miscellaneous, \$450.00; Borrowed from Bank, \$200.00; Balance in Bank, \$114.34. Total, \$9661.06.

Mr. Hess stated that to L. H. Pearce, manager of the fair and treasurer of the association, is due a great deal of the credit for the excellent showing made this year. Mr. Pearce has been indefatigable in his efforts to make the fair a success and has refused to accept one cent of compensation for the time he has spent. Hats off to Mr. Pearce. Another year or two like this one and he will have the fair association out of debt.

It Was a Slow Game

Not on account of the score, nor because U. of O. won over O. S. C. last Saturday, but because of the slowness of the game and the failure of either team to show anything brilliant, Coquille football fans have quite generally expressed themselves as disappointed with the annual football classic this year. Oregon won, as had been generally anticipated, by a 16-0 score. The injury to Kitzmiller, Oregon quarter, may have had something to do with the game's drab aspect, for he was the most colorful player on the field.

It is a pleasure to note that President Hall, of the university, has come out in opposition to playing the annual game between the two institutions in Portland, and it is hoped that his decision will be final. There are hundreds of fans in southern Oregon, as well as thousands of students at the college and university who would be unable to witness the annual clash were Portland to gobble the cream—and the students should be given the first consideration.

Myrtle Point Union High was too much for Coquille last Friday afternoon and the visitors won the game here, 20-0. Two of their touchdowns resulted from sweeping end runs that should have been spilled and the only excuse is that the M. P. interference was too much for the C. H. S. end.

S. C. game last Saturday.
