#### Another Pioneer Succumbs

The grim reaper brought to an end the sufferings of an old pioneer of this section, John David Bennett, on Tuesday afternoon of this week at his home in West Myrtle Point, where he and his wife have resided the past few months.

Mr. Bennett was born in Fayette county, Illinois, May 17th, 1848. When quite young he moved with his family to Logansport, Indiana, and from there to Minnesota, where he grew to manhood. From Minnesota he came to Umatilla county, Oregon, in 1872.

There he was married to Mary Belle Bunch, May 2, 1877, and moved to Coos county in 1880. To this union were born seven children, four of whom have preceded him in death. The living children are, Charles R., of Albany, Oregon; Arthur R., of Myrtle Point; and Mrs. Eva Breuer, of Myrtle Point. The deceased are, W. Walter, Edna M., R. Ray and Lois Luella.

About a year ago Mr. Bennett suffered a slight stroke of paralysis and later another stroke followed. Since that time he had been confined to his bed but most of the time retained his mental faculties. Services were conducted Wednesday at the Schroeder chapel by Elder Langberg, of Marshfield. After the services at the chapel the body was taken to Dora where it was laid to rest.

#### Knife-Pinkston Hospital Notes

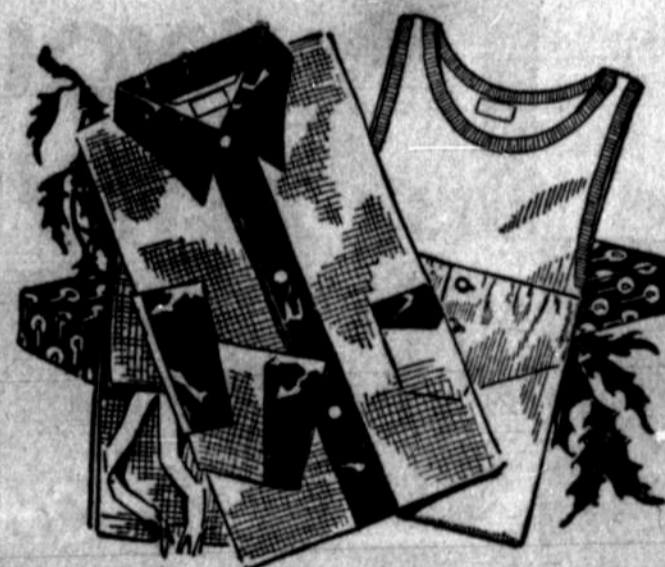
Mrs. Wallace Miller and small daughter were dismissed from the hospital Sunday. Their home is in Arago.
