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### Pres. Hall Hits Nail Squarely

There has been some criticism by football fans of the U. of O. faculty action in refusing to allow two or three of the boys, who were not up in their scholastic standings, to make the trip to Miami, Florida, for the East-West game down there last Saturday. This action was entirely proper. Football is and should be subordinate to academic standing, and not the paramount qualification. And along the same line is an excerpt from a signed statement by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the university, in which he discussed the proposed change in handling athletic activities at the university:

"One thought in conclusion needs to be brought out. There are too many graduates of different schools today who, with great bitterness, are denouncing their alma maters because they were allowed to play football and not required to do other work which would prepare them for the more serious work of life. They claim that all they received from their university was a knowledge of football, and that they were exploited to the benefit of the institution. I regret to say there have been times when these criticisms seem justified. I am unwilling, however, that such a situation should develop at Oregon. I want no football player to come to me after he has graduated and tell me that he learned nothing but football and therefore is unprepared for the battles of life. For this reason, if none other, I insist that football must be made a part of the educational program of the University, that students who play football must also be encouraged to do equally good work in other departments of the University—work that prepares them for some calling or some profession. I realize that football is a diversion, but if the players are required in addition to their football to maintain reasonable standards in a worthy educational program, they will develop a higher degree of concentration, of a sense of economy of time, and habits of mastery than will the other students who do not play. Moreover, football gives to the student body a splendid emotional outlet, for which we have too little wholesome opportunity in modern life. Under proper control and regulation this, in my judgment, is an asset rather than a liability."

### Three Short Courses at O. S. C.

Three specialized agricultural short courses have been scheduled for next month at Oregon State college in addition to the new plan of three-months practical work open to any high school graduate.

A buttermakers' course open to any one with some practical experience in creameries, begins January 20 and continues two weeks. It will consist of demonstrations, lectures and actual work in the college creamery.

Oregon bankers will co-operate with the extension service again this year January 23 and 24 for an annual agricultural short course to be held in Portland at the livestock exchange building. Methods followed on a certain livestock market will be studied.

The eighth annual canners' school will open January 27 for a three-week session. This school, which draws commercial canners from many sections of the United States and Canada, is divided into three periods, the first week being devoted to machinery, the second to canning fruits and the third to canning vegetables.

Under the new plan of a two-year curricula in practical phases of agricultural training, any high school graduate may enter Oregon State college at the beginning of any term and take three months work or more in a wide variety of courses. The winter term begins January 2 and ends March 20.

### Aviation News from Oakland

Raising of the standards under which aviation schools are permitted to operate may be expected to have a great, and very early, effect upon the business done by air transport companies. Regardless of what reasons may be assigned by persons approached with an invitation to travel over these routes, traffic solicitors for various companies declare that the real determining factor which keeps the average non-flier on the ground is fear.

This, of course, is the result of the frequent reports of crashes which appear in the press and in which, aviation men assert, too little discrimination is made between the accidents which befall inexperienced fliers, in badly-maintained planes, and the finely kept up equipment and splendid pilots of the great transport lines. By raising the standards of the aviation schools the government is taking steps to assure a higher standard of ability among even the inexperienced pilots, better training, wider experience and so lessened accidents.

This will undoubtedly enable the transport lines to build up a better degree of public confidence in aviation and so permit them to expand their business.

There were at last compilation 409 flying schools in the country. Not all of them, of course, have been inspected

### Voters Face Many Issues

Voters of Oregon will have an opportunity at the November, 1930, election to declare for or against a number of progressive measures, creating a policy for or against the state and subdivisions thereof getting into the public utility business. While this subject is so important that it deserves more complete mention and will in the future receive it, the purpose here is to notify the voters that never before have they had such an opportunity to be either progressive or conservative. In addition to the income tax, control of water power and several other measures, the voters are to be asked to pass an amendment to the constitution that will prohibit the use of cigarettes in Oregon. Such an array of measures is sure to arouse more than usual discussion and are worthy of the most careful consideration of the voters. An impartial survey will show that a majority of the laws upon which the people will vote involve matters of moment, closely dividing the people who believe in public control from those who are of the opinion that private ownership should obtain. The forces in favor of the progressive idea are better organized than ever before, and will be able to put up a stronger campaign. They will not have the money to spend that is possible by their opponents, but they have a better organization from a vote-getting standpoint. To a great extent it will be around these measures that the campaign will be fought, with many of the candidates forced to

take a stand for or against them.

### H. S. Conferences at U. of O.

High schools all over the state are being invited to send delegates to the Tenth Annual High School Conference at the University of Oregon, which will be held this year January 10 and 11. The conference will be divided into five sections, for the editors of high school papers and yearbooks, presidents of girl's leagues, student body officers and principals of high schools.

Coquille high school is entitled to four delegates to the conference, at which all phases of high school life will be discussed. An extensive program has been arranged by those in charge, and it is believed that students will find the sessions of great help in arriving at the solution of difficult problems.

Besides the numerous meetings, the delegates will be entertained by the Oregon Student committee at a reception and banquet, and will attend the opening basketball games of the year at McArthur court Friday and Saturday night against Washington State College. A tour of the campus and "College Night, a vaudeville entertainment, will also have places on the program.
