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The Ag. Meetings Last Week

New practices in poultry production and dairying and new crops for Coos County were discussed with the farmers in the series of meetings held over the county last week by specialists from Oregon Agricultural College and the county agent. These meetings, fourteen in number, were held in different communities and were well attended by interested groups of farmers.

In growing alfalfa, according to E. R. Jackman, farm crops specialist from O. A. C., it is a game that must be played by definite rules if success is to be expected. The rules laid down by Mr. Jackman are liming the soils where necessary, cultivating out weeds before seeding, inoculating the seed, seeding on a firm seed bed, using only certified Grimm alfalfa seed and cultivate the alfalfa after the second year.

Ladino clover and Austrian winter field peas were the other new crops which Mr. Jackman encouraged the farmers to plant for dairy feeding where conditions on their farms were favorable.

Prizewinner mangels, McKay's yellow dent corn and O. A. C. No. 7 barley are varieties of crops which are giving the best yields in Coos county, stated County Harvey S. Hale at the crop meetings.

At the dairy meetings N. C. Jamison, dairy specialist, exhibited a large number of charts showing the value of sires in improving the dairy herds. One chart which was of particular interest showed the differences between the income derived from a priceless sire and a valueless sire which amounts to over \$400.00 in one year. A question at the bottom of this chart asked what this would amount to in ten years?

A new calf meal, minerals for dairy cows and feeding cows for production were the other topics briefly discussed by Mr. Jamison. Good progress in the control and eradication of contagious abortion was reported by the County Agent.

The poultrymen who attended the poultry meetings were told by H. E. Cosby that the future of the poultry industry is bright for poultrymen who practice good management methods. Mr. Cosby briefly outlined the progress that has been made in poultry production, saying that it was equal to if not greater than that made in the manufacturing of automobiles.

How to prevent the fall moulting of pullets by proper feeding was another topic discussed by Mr. Cosby.

He also stated that Coos county with a mild climate and green feed for the poultry the year around should materially increase poultry production.
