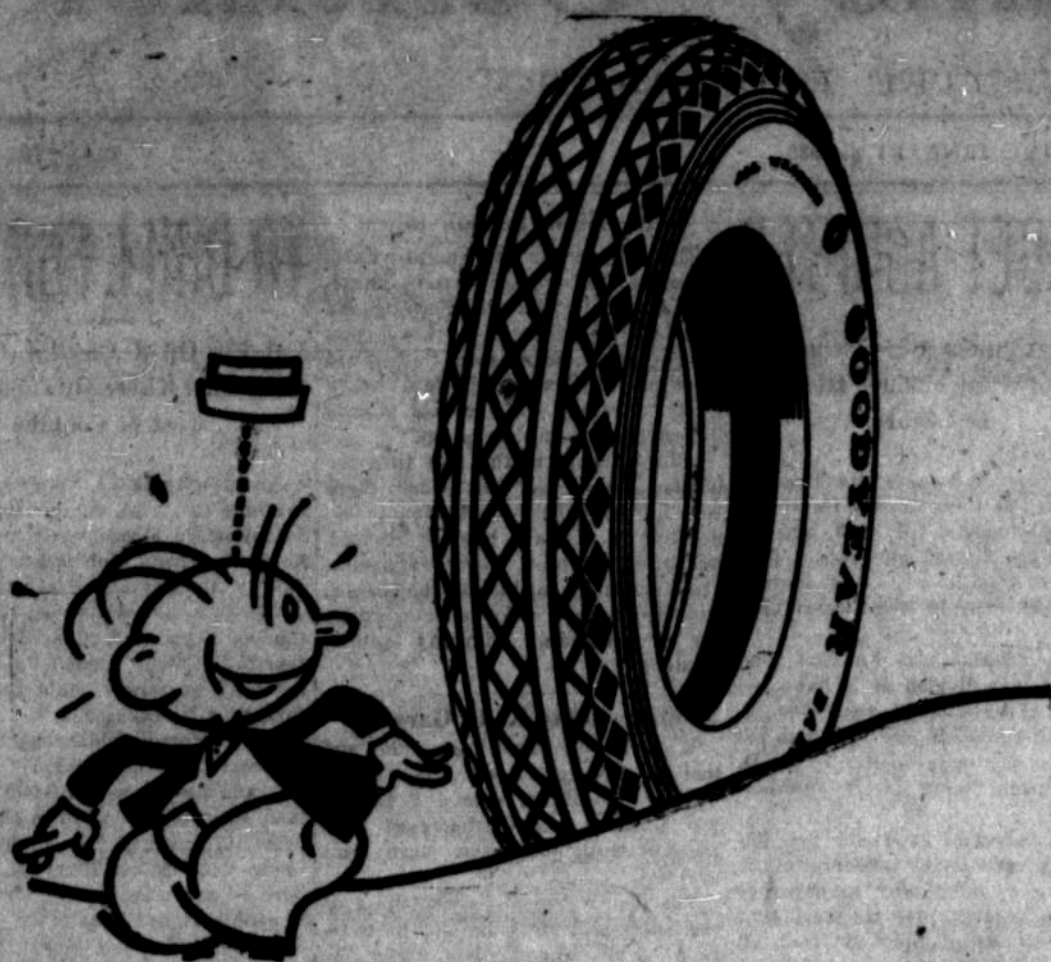

"Dynamite" Coming to

Hiland Theatre at M. P.

Once called by critics the "bizarre Cecil B. DeMille," it appears that the producer-director is about to reclaim the title in "Dynamite," which comes Sunday to the Hiland Theatre at Myrtle Point. It is his first talking picture.

It is his first picture in four years to present girls, gowns and gayety of the frivolous sort, although his early reputation was made with this type of material.

"Dynamite" is said to have food for the eye in two particular sequences, one at a country club, the other in the home of Cynthia, the feminine lead. The country club sequence finds Kay Johnson and Julia Faye racing in the sensational new "aero-wheels" to determine whether Miss Johnson shall pay \$100,000 or \$200,000 for Miss Faye's husband, Conrad Nagle.

To provide the dramatic leavening for this highly modern situation, DeMille shows Charles Bickford being condemned to death and, later, a marriage of Bickford to Miss Johnson on the eve of his execution. How Bickford escapes death, and what happens afterward, at a party in Cynthia's home, and in the coal mine of which the lead is gang boss, completes the dramatic framework of Jeanie MacPherson's latest original. It is evident, therefore, that "Dynamite" is the type of "Manslaughter," "Male and Female" and "Why Change Your Wife?" rather than "The Ten Commandments," "King of Kings" and "The Godless Girl," more recent De Mille productions.
