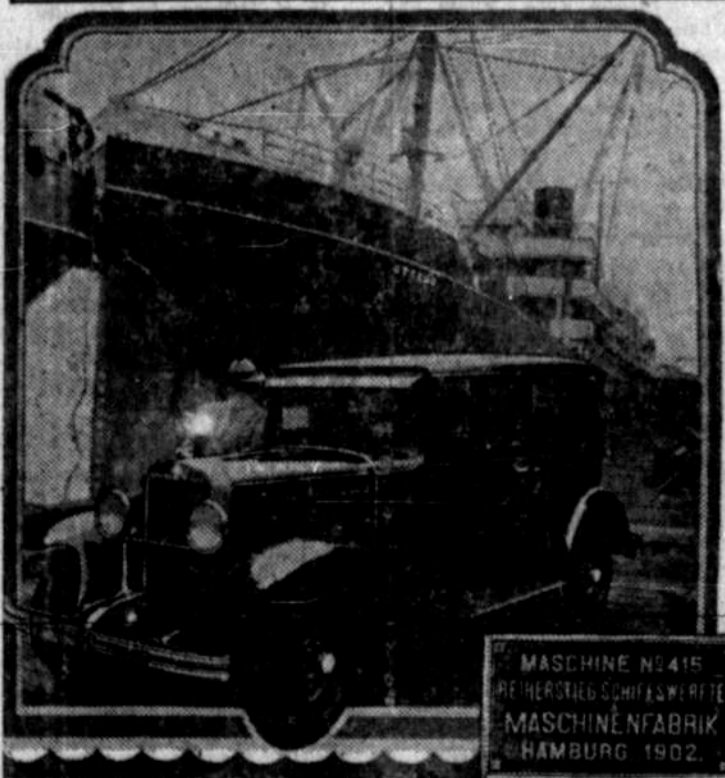

A New Lodge on the Rogue

Stanley Anderson, millionaire of Los Angeles, director of the Fox Films Corporation and oil operator, is calling for bids for the construction of a palatial lodge on the Cunningham place of 150 acres 4 miles above Agness on Rogue River, which he purchased two months ago.

Anderson, who was in Gold Beach Thursday and Friday inspecting his property on the Rogue, says the Reporter, selected a site for his lodge which will cost upwards of \$25,000, and left the plans and specifications for the structure with County Clerk Caughell who will open the bids on January 10.

The building will be of rustic construction in keeping with the surroundings. It will be 36 feet wide and 65 feet long. The main room will be the lounge 20 feet wide and 41.6 feet long with a mammoth fireplace having an opening seven feet wide and with a stone front running to the ceiling.

Rogue Bridge Bids Next Week

All of Oregon, particularly southwestern Oregon and the coast counties, is interested in the new bridge that is to be built across the Rogue river between Gold Beach and Wedderburn in Curry county. Bids will be received by the state highway commission January 16 and the completion date for the bridge is set for December 31, 1931, which means that practically two years will be allowed for the construction.

Plans for the bridge call for seven 230-foot reinforced concrete spans and 325 lineal feet of reinforced concrete approaches. The total length will be 1938 feet. It will be 27 feet wide with two three and one-half foot sidewalks. It will require 11,000 cubic yards of excavation, 42,000 lineal feet of piling, 15,300 cubic yards of concrete, 1,675,000 pounds of metal reinforcement and 82,000 pounds of structural steel.—Western World.
