SPORT BRIEFS

Next Friday night the Coquille High School basketball team will open the regular Coos County league, playing the Myrtle Point quintet on the Community Hall court. Up to date the locals have had a successful pre-season schedule and have shown a team that all opposition will find hard to beat. That Coquille is due to have a winning high school five is obvious and, in order to encourage the boys, it is up to the local fans to turn out for the home games. Nothing advertises a town more than a successful athletic team and nothing makes a successful team more than whole-hearted support from the townspeople.

In pre-season games so far Coach Hartley and Assistant Coach Grider have used the following in the regular positions: forwards, Ray Griffith and Jug Lorenz; guards, Everett Seeley and Stephen Chard; center, Denton Ellingson. In reserve there is Stanley Pulford, Linus Seeley, Jack McCue and several other boys who may be called into action at some time. Griffith and Lorenz are fine-shooting players and also hold up their end of the burden on defensive play. "Jug" is an especially good defensive man, always in there fighting to win. The guards, Chard and Seeley, are as good a defensive pair as any coach could wish for. Chard has the knack of grabbing off the opposition's passes and will figure strongly in Coquille's defense this year. Everett also has great ability in breaking up a team's offense and he keeps threatening as well to break into the leading score columns. Ellingson at center does his work in a business-like manner, getting the tip-off more than half the time from his opponent. His defense work is also all that could be asked for, as is his shooting. The three main reserves, Pulford, L. Seeley and McCue, are boys who will be able to break into the first team at any time without breaking up any combination. Stanley, with last year's experience to his credit, will likely see lots of action this year. Among other things, he has a fine shooting eye. Linus and Jack are only freshmen, so therefore have their best years ahead of them. Both have natural basketball ability and should break in quite a lot this season.

The high school teams of Marshfield and North Bend emerged victorious in games played last Friday, the former downing Port Orford, 12 to 13, and the latter swamping River-ton, 29 to 6. Prior to their defeat at the hands of the M. H. S. quintet, Port Orford had been undefeated. Among their victims was the fast Eugene Hi five. The North Bend-Riverton encounter was a loosely played affair with individual playing the game's feature.

Playing a return game in the Powers gymnasium last Saturday night the C. H. S. five met stronger opposition than they did in their first meeting with the Powers boys but were able to edge out a 19 to 13 victory. With the half ending with the locals in a 10 to 8 lead, Coquille came back in the last two periods to count up four baskets and a free throw that gave them the deciding margin.

The Coquille five played without the services of "Jug" Lorenz in their game with Riverton Tuesday night but his substitute, Stanley Pulford, fills his shoes in a satisfactory manner. Along with Ray Griffith, Coquille's scoring ace, Pulford made the majority of Coquille's points. The whole team played scrappy ball in the game but faulty passing held their score down. Ray was Coquille's high point man. He is showing a fine shooting eye and is proving a valuable addition to the team.

The Coquille Independents, or Brookfield Buttercups, added another victory to their list Wednesday night, by defeating the Arago Hi five 48 to 36. Arago was out to win the game but they could not cope with the greater experience of the Brookfield boys. Bill Oerding was high score man with 16 points.
