The third, a personal income tax is more straightforward and equitable than either of the others although it runs counter to Oregon's prejudice against an income tax.

Mr. Norton is a clear, convincing speaker and although he considered his subject a dry one, he made it very interesting to the writer and judging by the attention given him to the other listeners also.
