Mrs. Harry Varney, admitted early Saturday morning for treatment, is doing nicely.

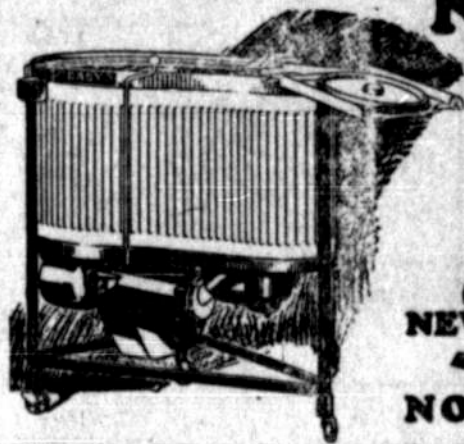
Mrs. Clara Jeffries, of Randolph, was brought up here yesterday for medical treatment.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

RIFLE TEAM RATES HIGH



In the national rifle matches held at Camp Perry, Ohio, last August, Harvey Wright, senior in the University of Oregon, tied for third place. He was also individual high point shot in the R. O. T. C. at the university last year.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore.—Competing for the famous trophy, "The Warrior of the Pacific," the University of Oregon R.O.T.C. rifle team representing the Ninth Corps Area, defeated all other teams in the mainland United States and was only defeated by the team representing the University of Hawaii, it was announced here by Major F. A. Barker, commandant of the unit here. The Warrior of the Pacific trophy, a handsome statue of an Hawaiian warrior, has been won every year by the team from the University of Hawaii, but this year the Islanders were closely pressed by the Oregon rifle-men, who scored an average of 297.639 against 211.478 by Hawaii. Oregon led its nearest competitor, Nebraska of the Seventh corps, by over 11 points, the Cornhuskers scoring but 196. They in turn had a substantial lead over Wisconsin, which turned in an average of 181.615. Syracuse ranked next, with Texas A. and M., North Carolina State College, Drexel Institute, DePauw, and Rhode Island state college ranking in order named.

Oregon had already won the "Dough Boy of the West" trophy and the right to represent the Ninth Corps area in the competition at summer camp this year.

Coquille Library Association

The annual meeting of the Coquille Library Association was held at the Library on Monday evening, January 13, to elect a board of directors for the coming year. The following were elected: Mrs. C. C. The newly elected board met again the next evening for the regular monthly meeting and elected the following officers:

A discussion of the highly gratifying treasurer's report occupied part of the evening and demonstrated that the Library had passed a successful year financially. Money had come in, a little here, a bit more there, which with the support of the city council enabled it to not only pay its bills but also purchase over \$500 worth of new books last year.

Part of this money was spent on the new Fourteenth Edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica. These volumes have become most popular, not only with the school children who find them invaluable for reference work; but also business people down town are forming the habit of dropping in, to get the last word on this or that question.

This new edition is written in a much simpler and more readable style than the encyclopedias heretofore published. It is also supplied with lovely illustrations, the finest obtainable, many of them colored and many reproductions of the world's great works of art.

As to finances for 1936, the prospects are not so bright. Funds have been provided by the city council for the running expenses of the Library, but there appeared to be no money in sight as yet with which to purchase books. With that under consideration it was announced that the Woman's Clubs had just that afternoon voted to give the Library ten dollars a month for books.

A library cannot function without new books. Books are read to pieces so fast. A hundreds books have been taken from the shelves recently—worn out. Some will be rebound, many are too far gone.

One of the most crying needs for the coming year is children's books. The school children come to the library for outside reading and all too often fail to find a single required book. One little Third Grade girl was heard to remark, "There's no use of my going to the library for I've read everything there."

A story hour has been provided for the younger children on Saturday afternoon under the direction of Mrs. Ulett and Mrs. Sanford and has proved tremendously popular.

"The Book of the Month" book for December has been called the best novel in ten years. It is, "The Good Companions," by Priestly, and it contains neither a divorce, a scandal nor a murder. It even leaves one feeling cheerful.

Tonight the Coquille High School basketball team opens its conference season, playing the Myrtle Point Hi quintet on the Community Hall court. Dope favors Coquille to win the game and if they do, it will be the first conference game the locals have won for three years. Coquille has a fine working team this season and one which will give all other county teams a battle. The C. H. S. quintet should be in the pennant race from the start and by the time the district tournament comes the five will be at its peak. Coquille has a fine chance of winning the tournament if present indications hold true. Local fans should turn out tonight and see their representatives in Coos county basketball start their season.

The Bandon Hi basketball team defeated the Port Orford Hi quintet last Friday night in the Bandon gym, 21 to 11. Earlier in the season the Curry county basketweavers had administered a 38 to 8 drubbing to the Bandon squad. The shooting of Sweet, Bandon forward, with 11 points, featured the encounter.

The Roseburg basketball quintet downed the Myrtle Point five, 29 to 17, in the opening conference game of the Coos county league last Friday night. Playing on their own floor the Roseburg team had little trouble in

defeating the visitors.

The Bandon team added another victory to their list Saturday night by defeating Powers, 19 to 11, on their own floor. Bandon played a close defensive game and did not at any time allow the Powers hoopsters to make any rallies.

Defeat Riverton Again

The Coquille High School basketball team defeated the Riverton five, 21 to 14, in a game played Tuesday at Riverton. Coquille took an early lead that was only once threatened, that in the third quarter when Riverton crept up within 3 points of the locals.

Griffith, of Coquille, started the scoring when he looped in a long shot. It was soon followed by a free throw conversion by Smith, Riverton forward. After this Coquille took a commanding lead on baskets by Griffith, Pulford and Everett Sealey. The half ended with the C. H. S. squad in a 11 to 3 lead.
