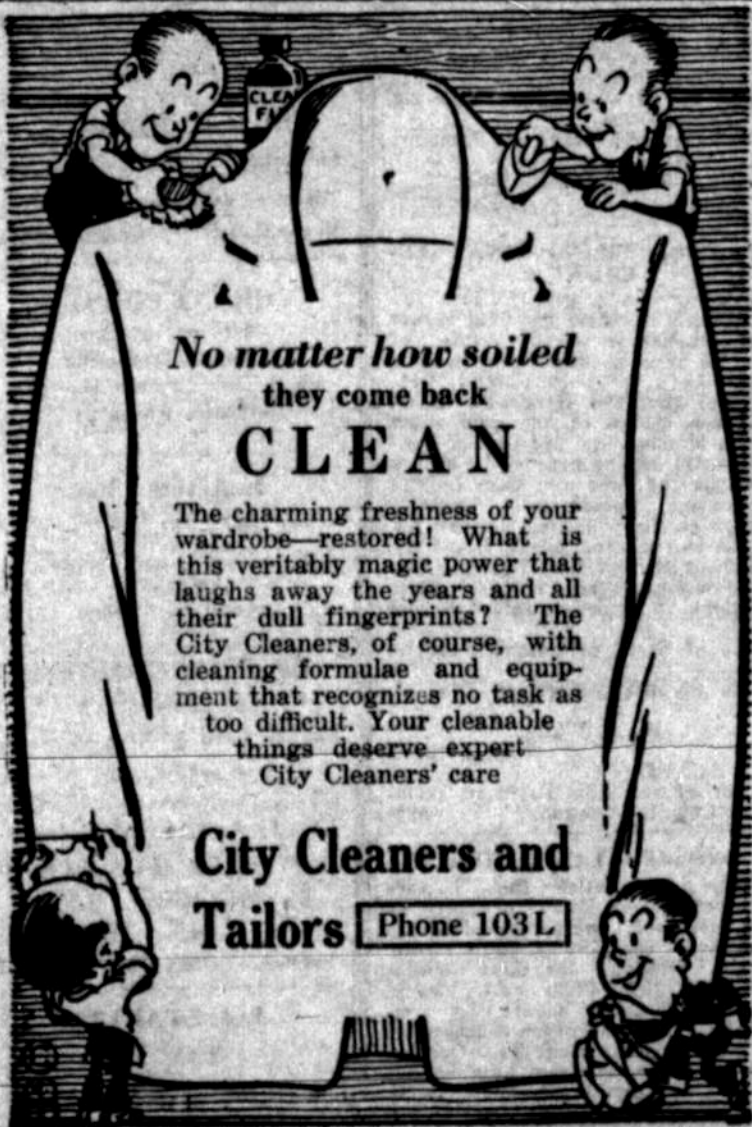

County Requisitions Necessary

Below is a copy of a county court order, adopted Monday, which requires that requisitions for needed purchases of machinery and equipment, be passed on in open court sessions before an order is given for such equipment:

In the Matter of Purchasing of County Machinery, Equipment and Material Whereas, it has been the custom and practice of the members of Coos County Court to pass on and order the purchase of machinery, equipment and material for Coos county for which Coos county is obligated to pay without the same being passed on and ordered, and the purchase authorized at regular session of the Court; and Whereas, the practice has resulted in some inquiry and some criticism; and

Whereas, it appears that the better custom and practice would be that all machinery, equipment and material ordered, except for incidental repairs in the road department of the county, should be first presented to the Court on requisition before any action was taken thereon by any member, or members, of this court; that the same passed upon only at a regular session of the court; and

Be it further resolved, that when any cast-off equipment, scrap-iron and any other material no longer required for county use that the court be notified by the county road master, he setting his estimate of what, in his opinion, the selling price should be.

Now therefore be it resolved by this court, that the above resolution be adopted and spread upon the records of the County Court Journal and from this date all machinery, equipment and material necessary for the road department of Coos County, Oregon, shall first be presented to the Court on requisition and passed by the Court at regular session before the same shall be ordered, except incidental repairs or strict emergency purchases and that no machinery whatsoever should be ordered and purchased and the purchase thereof authorized in any other manner.
