Coquille Flower Lovers Club Notes

Just to remind you on February 4th of the interesting as well as educational questions that will be answered. Everyone is cordially invited to attend.

Again and again I am asked about the hollyhock blight or rust; can it be prevented? Can it be cured? Well, that will depend upon how badly your plants are affected when you start at the task. Prevention is largely a matter of spraying early, just before growth starts in the spring, and keeping it up all through the season. Spray with Bordeaux and lime-sulphur, not only the plants, both the upper and lower surface of the foliage and the stems as well, but also the soil around them. The rust is caused by small spores or fungus growth that live over in the soil and upon the dead foliage. It may be spread by the wind even so that your fight will have to be kept up all through the season.

Once the rust has gotten started with your plants, spraying will check it and keep it in control if you will do it regularly. If, however, you merely spray once or twice and let it go at that, your plants will not be rid of the disease. Break off and burn any diseased foliage. Cleaning up in the fall and keeping the borders clean through the season are important in the fighting of any fungus disease. If you will be a good housekeeper in

your garden you will find the troubles from all sources will not be as bad.

Someone asks about the growing of the moon flowers. They are of the morning-glory family, but open their flowers at dusk. There are few more delightful pictures in the garden of an evening than a well-grown mass of moon-flowers in full bloom, clambering over their support to a height of possibly 30 feet. They should be planted with care as to their exposure so that when they are in bloom they will be where the moonlight will show them off to the best advantage. They may be grown from seeds or cuttings. The seeds are very hard and slow to germinate, so that they should be soaked in scalding water or filed through before planting to hurry up their germination.

The question is asked as how to propagate Japanese anemones. These beautiful flowers may be raised from seed, or the old clumps may be divided. Spring is the best time to divide them, but seeds are best sown in the fall just as soon as they are ripened. They need a light soil, and must not be allowed to dry out. The Japanese anemones are one of the most delightful of the fall flowers and should be planted a great deal more than they are. One thing seldom realized by the average gardener is that they are better without cultivation, but just mulched. The reason for this is that they produce great masses of fine, feeding rootlets close to the surface and cultivation will harm them. Mulch with an inch of leaf mold or peat moss or even lawn clippings. Look out for things carrying in weed seeds, as they may be difficult to get rid of without injury to the plants. Use these anemones in groups and masses in the middle and rear of your borders and they will add an airy grace to the plantings equalled by few other things.—Romaine B. Ware.

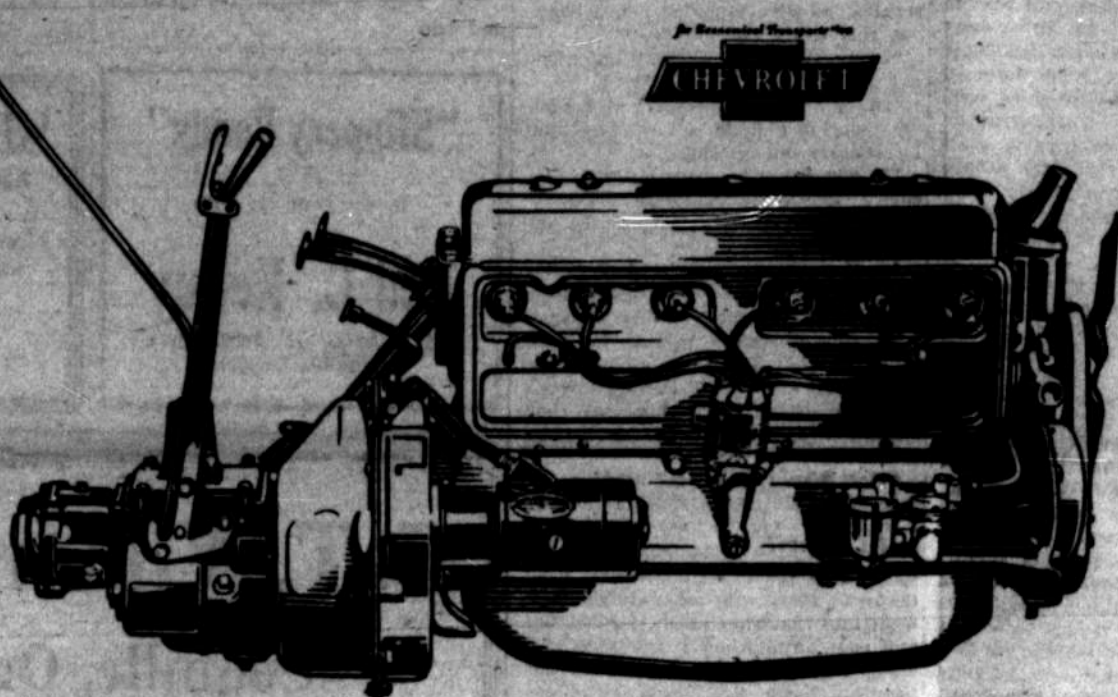

A Tough Game to Lose

A foul shot conversion in the last ten seconds of play gained a 21 to 20 victory for the North Bend Hi basketball team from the Coquille Hi quintet in the game played last Friday night at North Bend. The result was almost an exact repetition of the 28 to 27 defeat the Bay five took from the Roseburg hoopers two weeks ago when the latter team also won in the last few seconds.

North Bend opened the scoring by hooping two successive free throws. The count was soon evened when Lorenz looped a basket on a long one-handed push shot. From this point on both teams played hard, fast ball with Coquille coming out at the half with an 8 to 6 lead. These first two periods were hot but the last half was torrid.

At the start North Bend evened the count. This was the signal for action and how it came. The game became a meet of speed with Coquille gradually pulling ahead until at four and half minutes to go they had gained a 15 to 13 margin, and then the breaks came. It happened that they went against the locals. To make a long story short, North Bend made eight points in this remaining time while Coquille was only able to gain four. But three of the winners' markers were made on free throws after questionable fouls had been called.

It was a tough game for the C. H. S. boys to lose after they had out-speeded and really outplayed North Bend throughout, but the opinion is that they can take it on the chin and come back fighting for more. The team looked plenty good in this game and local fans do not have to think they are out of the race even if the first two games have been lost. Line-ups:
