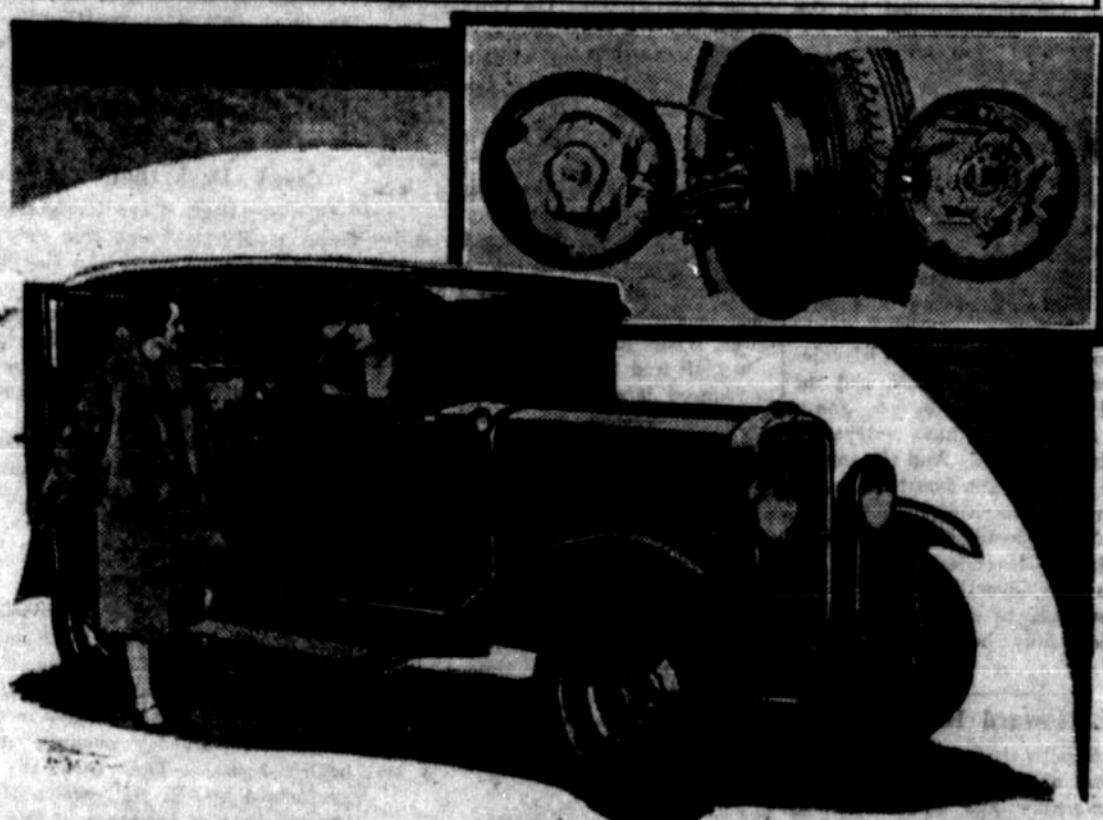

People in this world are divided into two classes, those who hate to be kept waiting because it bores them and those who love to wait because it gives them time to think. If you are one of the former, read Ernest Dimmet's "Art of Thinking," (now in its eighty-sixth thousand) and you may become one of the latter.

"Concentration is more of a habit than a gift," says Mr. Dimmet. Learn how to read a newspaper as a page from history. More history been recorded in the news prints in the last decade than the world has ever known before.

"Be Yourself," "Find Yourself" and "Treat Intuitions Tenderly," are further advised in this delightful book, which is as easy to read as it is instructive, and cheerful even with showing us how much we don't know.

The January "Book of the Month" is a Biography of Benjamin Franklin, by Bernard Fay. It is interesting to note that Ben Franklin founded the first circulating library. He was after all very much of a modernist, a promoter and a propagandist. Whenever there was a public cause that interested him, he immediately set to work to educate public opinion in its support. Present day publicity experts and politicians can only gasp at his industry, audacity and patience. It is said that Franklin was one of the great products of the most civilized of all centuries—the Eighteenth—and one of the three men who understood women.

This book is a real biography and true history and the result of five years of study and research by Mr. Fay.

A fine collection of children's books have been added to library recently, in accord with the policy of the book committee to increase the children's department as much as possible in 1936. One of the books best liked by boys in our library is "Count Luikner, the Sea Devil," by Lowell Thomas. Now we have another by the same author called, "The Hero of Vincennes." This is the story of George Rogers Clark, the Clark of Louis and Clark, who with a few ragged followers, waded icy swamps and surprised the astonished British garrison into surrender of the important outpost of Vincennes, Ohio. Less than 150 men crossing the country in mid-winter, lacking food, clothes, and supplies, captured the fort and gave us this great expanse of rich country.

"A Voyage to Treasure Land," by Anna Curtis Chandler is a fascinating book of unusual nature, and beautifully illustrated. Who has never wandered through a museum and thrilled with wonder at the thousands of objects, trying to look his fill and not knowing where to start, so many lovely things clamoring for his attention all at once. Miss Chandler is a magician, she makes the art treasures of our greatest and finest museum come alive in this lovely book. She tells stories about the objects in the museum and carries one right back to Ancient Greece at her games; then Rome and Julius Caesar; then China, England, old Belgium, Spain, New York and Captain Kidd, and many other places and figures, and all are illustrated from the real objects and treasures about which the stories are told.
