SPORT BRIEFS

The fast Coquille High School basketball team at last accomplished what it has been capable of doing all season by winning a game Tuesday night. They snowed Marshfield under by a 33 to 7 score and, in doing so, presented one of the best displays of teamwork seen in local basketball circles for years. On both offense and defense the C. H. S. combination worked with the smoothness of a well-oiled machine.

There was no really outstanding player, even if one or the other of the boys did score more points than a mate. Denton Ellingson, lanky center, played one of the best games of his career. He obtained the tip-off almost at will and worked on offense and defense in a very satisfactory manner. The forwards, "Jug" Lorenz and Ray Griffith, were the leading basket cagers of the evening, with the former making 14 points and the latter 8. "Jug" played his same old fighting game, while Ray displayed a floor game that would do any

basketball justice. Everett Seeley and Stephen Card, those stonewall guards, who never break down, were responsible more than the other boys for the low Marshfield score. Everett, as well, showed an improved shooting eye. Stephen broke up play after play and was a thorn in the Marshfield offense at all times. Three subs, Linus Seeley, Stanley Pulford and Ray Woodyard, were in only for short times but gave a good account of themselves nevertheless.

All the other teams are taking their victories and losses as is expected and at present Roseburg is leading the district conference with five wins and no defeats. Coach Hod Turner's team is strong and fast, being built around Hoffman at center and Keonig at forward. Hoffman is a powerful fellow and his quick breaking under the basket is fundamental in making points. Keonig is fast and shifty and of the spectacular dribbling type of player.

"Jug" Lorenz, Coquille's flashy forward, is leading his team in scoring up to date, with 18 field goals for a total of 36 points. The scoring of the local team follows:

Myrtle Point won 14 to 6 in that game but the general opinion is that the Coquille boys can turn the tables this time and emerge victorious. Coach Hartley will send his cardinal-clad hoopers out to win and if they show the same ability that has marked their last three starts good results can be expected. The team has been showing good form in practice this week and is in tip-top condition for the fray.

After an opening basket by Ray Griffith, both teams played even-up ball through the first half. Keonig was the main Roseburg field goal thrower, while the Coquille points were evenly divided among the players. The half-time score found Coquille in a 12 to 11 lead.

Roseburg came back with vengeance in their eyes in the second half and by the end of the third quarter had a 22 to 18 lead. The local basketweavers tried hard but tough luck on making shots was encountered. In the last period Roseburg made three more points and held Coquille scoreless.
