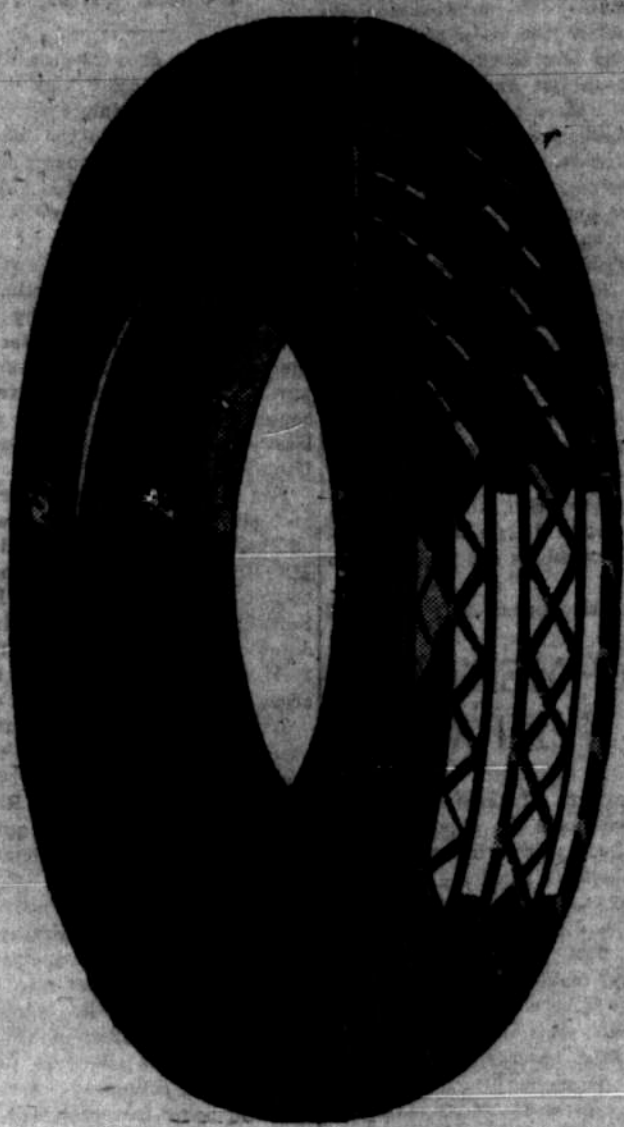

The Coquille High School at their last student body meeting decided not to publish an annual yearbook this year. The annual staff has put on a very strenuous subscription campaign among the high school students the last week. After counting the paid-up and promised subscriptions it was found that only forty-seven per cent of the high school students wanted an annual. The staff felt that if only forty-seven per cent of the students desired an annual they would not be justified in asking the Coquille business men to help finance the annual.

The budget for the 1930 Laurel called for an expenditure of \$400. There is some question as to whether the expenditure of this amount of money is justified in a high school of this size. The trend among the smaller high schools is not to publish a year book. Bandon High School published a very good annual last year, but the publication warped the student finances to the breaking point. This year Bandon High School is not publishing an annual yearbook.

It is unfortunate that no annual will be published, because there is some sentiment attached to the yearbook and some students get a great deal of experience in editing and publishing the annual. But in the final analysis does the expenditure and effort justify the publication of a high school annual yearbook?

Paul McElwaine Predicts Good Chevrolet Year

Highly elated over business prospects in the Pacific Northwest for 1930, Paul McElwaine, local Chevrolet dealer, returned last Saturday after attending the annual Chevrolet Motor Company spring dealer meeting in Portland Thursday and Friday. More than 400 dealers, salesmen and their bankers attended the convention which covered a two-day period.

The conferences were directed by D. E. Ralston, assistant general sales manager, Chevrolet Motor Company, who is heading a party of executives touring the Pacific Northwest region. An additional highlight of the convention was the presence of W. S. Knudsen, president of Chevrolet Motor Company, who was an interested spectator at the meetings.

Another feature of the convention, according to Mr. McElwaine, was the tribute paid by Mr. Ralston to the members of the Hundred Car Club, comprised of Chevrolet salesmen in the Portland zone who sold 100 or more cars during 1929, and of which Bob Bennett, of Coquille, is a member.

"Mr. Ralston complimented these men upon their achievements during the past year," said Mr. McElwaine. "He told them that they had demonstrated their ability to cope with the developing Pacific Northwest market, and felt sure that the Hundred Car Club men and dealers would recognize the trade potentialities in this territory for 1930."

Mr. McElwaine also said that talking pictures were used to illustrate new methods of servicing and distributing automobiles. Playlets and skits, treated in dramatic form, were also used to teach dealers and salesmen the proper procedure in handling their sales and business problems.
