Says Political Machines and Bosses Are Necessary

W. C. Jones, one of the faculty of Willamette University at Salem, was a Coquille visitor yesterday, endeavoring to interest some of this year's high school senior class in the university.

He was also a guest at the Lions' Club luncheon yesterday noon and spoke to the club on the subject of politics. Machine politics and political bosses, according to Mr. Jones, are as inevitable as taxes and death, and cannot be avoided under the American system of party government.

Mr. Jones did not contend that they are necessarily correct in practice, nor that the boss and machine are undesirable if honest in their political manifestations.

He did not commend the bossism of the late Bois Penrose, of his native state of Pennsylvania, nor did he condemn. His talk was more along the line of facing facts and he stated that every community has its boss. All of which may, and may not, be correct.

Economy of time, which he presumed his hearers would prefer he observe, called to his mind the meaning of "rigid economy," which he defined as a dead Scotchman.

The biggest boosters and the biggest liars on earth live in Los Angeles, Mr. Jones remarked and he told of a funeral service where the preacher spoke of all the good he could of the deceased, and then asked if any one else had anything further to say. After a moment's wait a man in the rear of the room arose to remark, "If no one else has anything to say I might talk about Los Angeles."
