For Deeper Water at Bandon

J. E. Norton, president of the Port of Bandon, O. C. Shindler, Ray McNair and John Moore, of Bandon, drove up to Portland Tuesday to confer with Col. G. R. Lukeash, army engineer, in charge of federal harbor work on the Oregon coast.

The four Coos county men had a session with Col. Lukeash and presented to him the urgent needs of the port to make it a satisfactory harbor for ocean shipping.

In particular they pointed out the need for a more efficient dredge than the No. 11 which has been assigned to the mouth of the Coquille. They found the Colonel a willing listener and he assured them this his department was interested in their problems and that he would do what he could to comply with their requests. Just how much jettty work will be recommended by the board of engineers in Washington will depend on Col. Lukeash's report, and it is anticipated that he will aid in restoring a 13-foot channel and entrance to the river.
