"Another Taxpayer" Replies to "A Taxpayer"

the mills of justice proceeded to grind with grand jury in long and continued service, auditors, clerks and others, proceeded to delve and dig into the records and continued for months at an expense upon the taxpayers of Coos County, that ran into many thousands of dollars. Result of that losing and expensive fiasco: the County Court still stands unaccused—and we have the Judge Thompson regime—that condition being a direct result of an anonymous letter—but, of course, that is different.

Again, some months after Judge Thompson assumed the position at the head of the County Court, the Court being in session and the mail having been delivered upon the desk, his honor selected an envelope and tossed it, unopened, to the commissioners, with the remark that they might open it. Lo, and behold, it was also anonymous and consisted, we are informed, of the most diabolical attack upon Commissioner Jenkins and exemplified the venom spouted forth by a dastardly coward who dares not tell Commissioner Jenkins to his face. Comment upon such actions are unnecessary.

As to the nasty sneer about Mr. Mast receiving aid from the indigent fund: The self-appointed guardians of the County funds need not have any fears on his account, as we learn from the tax rolls that he returns to the County about 63 per cent of his salary in payment of taxes, but on the other hand if some other should be suddenly thrust upon a cold and cruel world, alms might not be amiss.

We are also informed when the "Anonymous Resolution" was under discussion Judge Thompson declared he would enjoy payment and we have learned that Mr. Jenkins then refused to pass the resolution, as the taxpayers have been called upon to pay and pay for investigations, injunctions, etc., that have crowded the calendar for the years 1929 and 1930. We also learn that Commissioner Jenkins was not so much exercised about the resolution in question as he is about the manner in which the payroll has been handled for some months past.

We are informed that some months ago the payroll was changed, supposedly by his honor, increasing the salary of a deputy in the court house from \$135.00 per month to \$150.00 per month, the Commissioners not being informed of the change and it was not detected by them till some time afterward. This increase will run into the hundreds, yet his honor said nothing about an injunction.

The same procedure was had in the case of Mr. Mast, the Commissioners approved the payroll ignorant of the change.

Again: Mr. Begg, the reporter of the Circuit Court who is upon the County payroll at the rate of \$175.00 per month, as are other officials and employees, and being incapacitated by reason of an accident and unable to perform his duties for a period of two months, nevertheless he received full payment for the time and in addition a substitute was paid \$10.00 per day and expenses to carry on the work, and it has transpired that Mr. Begg has since received several thousands of dollars as damages and compensation for said accident, and not any in-

junction emanated from the County Court.

Again: In the latter part of 1929 a deputy in the law enforcement department of the Sheriff's office resigned. Later the County Court made him a present of \$75.00 and no injunction by the self-appointed watchdog of the County funds followed; and we have the famous Klockers case that was conceived by the warped minds of certain individuals and, though we have a District Attorney whose duty it is to prosecute offenders against the County and to defend the County, nevertheless an outside attorney was employed to prosecute this nefarious case at an expense nearing a thousand dollars, but when this went before an unbiased and honest jurist the case crumbled to dust and has been abandoned. This was clearly a case of persecution against a man who has for many years performed labor himself and with his equipment for Coos County and in a satisfactory manner; otherwise he would not have been employed.

In conclusion, to quote "A Taxpayer," "what's wrong with our voters? Nothing in particular—they are awakening."
